[?Hancock] of Taunton has just brought my salvation — It will I fear be impossible for me to sustain my cruel situation much longer; I am so weak as to be scarcely able to cross the room – The poor child has been ill ever since my confinement – M<sup>r</sup> Andrews has had the goodness to send me £2 – for gods sake sir repeat my thanks to him – he did it as others do evil duty – <u>privately.</u> My state of mind is s [sic] is so I can hardly write & I almost forget that I have no right to trouble you which reminds me that I write to inquire you to let me know if the parcel and letter I sent you went off before your going to London – More than you can imagine depends upon them – They must be the salvation of my poor children if they love me! I have not rec<sup>d</sup> a farthing from M<sup>r</sup> L. but I am no in want of any thing at present. I ask a thousand pardons Sir for the trouble I am Sir
