Parent Nominees

David Bibo: Thanks for considering me to represent you on Maury's principal selection committee. CAG has been an amazing leader, and she played a decisive role in Erin and I relocating to Maury's boundary. Our next principal has challenges ahead, including leading children, teachers, and staff through another year in Maury Village, into our new school building, and through continued evolutions in our community.
