Introduction and Welcome

Hello future AP Human Geography student!

I'm very excited that you will be taking my AP Human Geography course.

You have selected to take a college-level course taught similarly to an introductory human geography course taught on a college campus. That means that our textbook, all assignments, readings, and exams are written at the college level. This class is inherently more difficult than middle school, college prep, and honors classes. Many students who earned straight A's in middle school will notice that they have to develop new study techniques and devote more time and effort in order to earn a high grade in an AP class. The summer assignment includes the following components:

- Part 2 Free Response Questions (2 total)
- Part 3 Map assignment

The entirety of your assignment must be organized, legible, and <u>written in your own words</u>. You cannot type any portion of this assignment.

You will make a packet of the following assignments and turn it in on the **second** day of school:

- 1. Current event log
- 2. Free response question essays (2 total)
- 3. World map with plotted current event locations
- *Note: You will be assessed on the contents of the Map Assignment during the first week of school.

AP Human Geography Summer Assignment

Part 1: Current Event Log & Map

Part of becoming a global citizen is becoming more aware of what is happening in the world around you. Paying attention to what is happening in the news will help to illuminate the locations and concepts we will study, and current events will often be used as conceptual examples in class.

You must keep a running current event log of 10 significant events (approximately 1 event per week) that occur throughout the summer. The bulk of your current events should be focused on global events or world news; however, some national or local events could be acceptable. You will also be responsible for finding your own map to plot the locations of each current event.

Guidelines

Your 10 current events **should** come from the following world regions. You do not need to include every region, but try to avoid having all of your events come from one or two regions (the more regions you can include the better). Reference the map at the end of this packet to help you identify these regions.

- South West Asia
- South Asia
- East Asia

- South East Asia
- North AfricaSub-Saharan Africa
- Western Europe
- North America
- Latin America

Possible Topics

The purpose of this assignment is to prepare you for the global issues we will be discussing in this course. In order to take full advantage of the goals of this assignment, your current events should connect to the following themes:

- Population
- Migration
- Resource Management
- Agriculture
- Geopolitical Issues
- Medical & Technological Advances
- Language
- Religion
- Political Conflict & Unrest
- Urban Development
- Urban Life/Trends
- Globalization
- Industry / Business / Manufacturing

*Note: You do not need to include every topic in your current event log. These topics are guidelines to ensure that your current events are relevant to this course.

You will record the events you find in the graphic organizer at the end of this packet. It looks like the one below. This chart should be organized and easy to read, it should reflect your best work. YOUR WORK MUST BE HANDWRITTEN OR YOU WILL EARN A GRADE OF ZERO.

In addition to your log, map each of the events on the world map included in the back of the packet. You can simply number the locations to coincide with your log entries. For example, if your first event occurred in Japan, then you should put the number 1 in Japan on a world map.

Resources for Current Events (these are recommendations, there are a lot of news outlets available free of charge)

- CNN 10: a daily, 10-minute news update designed for teenagers great because it not only describes the news, but it also explains the significance of events! A word of caution: the program does take most of the summer off, but I recommend that you watch it on a daily basis during the school year.
- BBC News: a major news services out of the United Kingdom good for getting a less biased perspective
- Washington Post: major news service out of D.C.
- NPR (National Public Radio): excellent to listen to, but you can also find major stories under the "world" or

- "US" links at the top
- NY Times: major news service out of New York
- Reuters: another news service out of the United Kingdom
- The Economist: major news service out of London

Part 2: Video, Article, and Free Response Questions (FRQ)

Answer the following FRQs on a separate sheet of paper using complete sentences and specific details. There are resources/examples online that can help you write and format your FRQs. It is your responsibility as an AP student to find your own resources. You can also reference the FRQ Checklist in the "Student Support" section of my website for additional help. Follow the directions for each FRQ, then carefully write your response for each.

 - a. Identify two countries in the core, two countries in the semi-periphery, and two countries in the periphery.
 - b. Compare characteristics of countries in the Core AND in the Periphery.
 - c. Explain the impact of colonization on the Core-Periphery Model.

Part 3: Map Assignment

Before we can dive into a thematic study of worldwide occurrences and interactions, you will need a strong understanding of where world regions, countries, major cities, and physical features are located. Please study the list of countries, cities, physical features, and world regions to the point where you can identify and place each on a map. We will be covering many of these places as case studies throughout the year. You will not be submitting anything for this part of the summer assignment, however you will need to be ready for an extensive map test during the first week of school. How you study and prepare for that assessment is entirely up to you.


