Stop the Mayor Adams Rent Hike

What's being proposed:

 The Adams Administrations Department of Social Services (DSS) is proposing a rule change that would raise the household contribution for CityFHEPS families with earned income from 30% to 40% of their income when renewing beyond Year 5 for "good cause."

Why This Policy Is Harmful

Imposes Rent Burden by Design:

This rule would make it *City policy* to force rent burden on low-income households—reversing the core principle that no family should have to pay more than 30% of their income toward rent.

Punishes Families for Working:

Households with earned income are affected. Households who have followed the rules, maintained housing, and secured work would now face a 10% rent hike.

Undermines Stability and Self-Sufficiency:

The current 30% cap allows families to stabilize, build savings, attend school, and maintain jobs. A 40% rent burden will push families to the brink, undermining their long-term stability.

• Threatens Housing Stability and Increases Homelessness Risk:

Most households surviving under the current formula will be unable to afford a sudden 10% increase in rent, risking eviction and re-entry into the shelter system.

💸 Fiscal Impact: Penny Wise, Pound Foolish

Projected "Savings" Are Misleading:

The City says this policy will save \$11 million—a mere **0.01% of the City budget**—but it ignores downstream costs like:

One-shot deals from HRA

- Legal costs under Right to Counsel
- Emergency shelter placements
- If just 1% of the families impacted by this policy fall back into homelessness, the expected savings being touted by the city disappear entirely.
- Increased Homelessness Costs More:
 Shelter stays can cost \$6,000/month per family, vastly outweighing any savings from higher rent contributions.

Families Can't Afford This

- CityFHEPS households are already deeply low-income:
 - Must earn less than 200% of the federal poverty line to originally qualify for the program (e.g., \$51,636/year for a family of 3).
 - Can earn up to 80% AMI once on the program
- According to the Robin Hood Foundation, families in NYC at this income level already struggle to afford:
 - Food
 - Childcare
 - Healthcare
 - Transportation
- A 10% increase in rent will leave families choosing between rent and basic survival

What We're Asking For

- Withdraw the proposed rule.
- Maintain the 30% income cap for all CityFHEPS households, including those with earned income beyond Year 5.
- Invest in stability—not instability.
