1.Parts of Speech

To begin with understanding what the concept of Parts of Speech, let's see an example, Water the plants.

Plants need water.

In the above sentence the word Water is Verb in the first sentence and Noun in the second. It shows us that even if a word has the same meaning it can play a different function in a sentence.

Hence parts of Speech means the different eight types of functions that word play in a sentence. Let's see all of them in detail as follows,

1. Nouns:

A noun is a word that represents the name of a person, place, thing, or idea.

Examples: cat, city, happiness, computer

Ram is my name.

Rivers are polluted.

2. Pronouns:

A pronoun is a word that is used instead of a noun or it takes the place of a noun to avoid repetition.

Examples: he, she, it, they

He is good in English.

They are late today.

3. Verbs:

A verb expresses an action or a state of being, it makes a sentence meaningful.

Examples: run, is, jump, think

He runs fast.

It is a cat.

4. Adjectives:

An adjective describes or modifies a noun.

Examples: happy, blue, tall, quick

Neha is a tall girl.

Sam is a smart boy.

5. Adverbs:

An adverb modifies a verb, adjective, or another adverb, often indicating how, when, where, or to what extent.

Examples:quickly, very, here, yesterday

He ran quickly leaving everyone behind.

They cook so fast that I was amused.

6. Prepositions:

A preposition is a word or group of words used before a noun, pronoun, or noun phrase to show direction, time, place, location, etc.

Examples: in, on, at, by He is sitting below the trees.

Cat is under the table

7. Conjunctions:

A conjunction connects words, phrases, or clauses.

Examples: and, but, or, because

Ronit and his father are very smart.

I was late but I have completed my task.

8. Interjections:

An interjection is a word or phrase that expresses strong emotion or surprise.

Examples: wow, ouch, hey, oh

Wow what a great game!

Alas they were defeated!

2.Articles

Articles are words that define a noun as specific or unspecific. There are two types of articles: definite (the) and indefinite (a, an). Understanding and using articles correctly is crucial for clear and precise communication in English.

<u>Indefinite Articles</u>:(a, an)

- "A" is used before words that begin with a consonant sound (e.g., a book, a car).
- "An" is used before words that begin with a vowel sound (e.g., an apple, an hour).

Examples -

- 1. I saw a movie last night.
- 2. She has an umbrella.

<u>Definite Article</u>:(the)

- "The" is used to refer to specific nouns that are known to the reader or listener (e.g., the book on the table, the car you drove).

Examples -

- 1. The movie we watched was amazing.
- 2.Please pass the salt

Rules for using Articles:

1.First Mention:

Use "a" or "an" when mentioning something for the first time (e.g., I saw a cat).

Subsequent Mentions:	
2.Use "the" when referring to something already mentioned (e.g., The cat was black)	
Unique Objects:	

3.Use "the" for unique objects (e.g., the sun, the moon).

The Wilma Rudolph story. - special case, she is the only girl who was paralyzed but won a gold medal in a relay race.

4. Superlatives:

Use "the" with superlative adjectives (e.g., the best, the tallest).

5. General vs. Specific:

Use "the" when referring to something specific and "a/an" when referring to something general (e.g., I need a pen vs. I need the pen you have).

6.Omission of Articles:

General Statements:

Articles are omitted in general statements about uncountable nouns and plural countable nouns (e.g., Milk is good for you, Cats are friendly).

Names of Places:

Articles are often omitted before names of countries, cities, streets, and some institutions (e.g., France, New York, Oxford Street, Harvard University).

Examples -

- 1. Water is essential for life.

Use "the" before adjectives when referring to a group (e.g., the rich, the poor).

Some fixed expressions use articles uniquely (e.g., in a hurry, at the hospital).

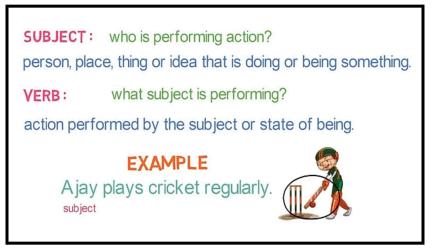

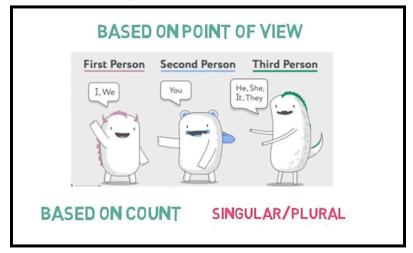

• Understanding 1st person, 2nd person and 3rd person in English language (Singular and Plural form)

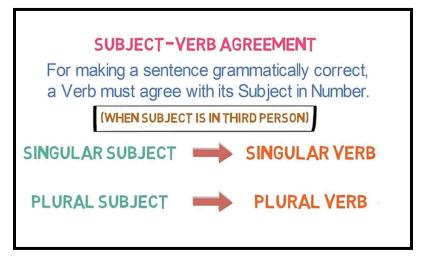


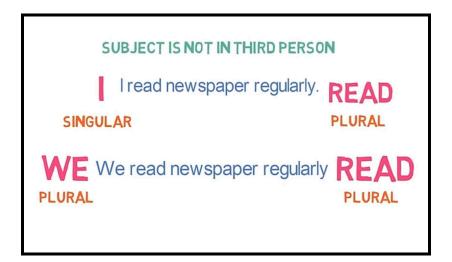
What is the Subject-Verb Agreement?

In any sentence, Singular Subject must have a Singular Verb and Plural Subject must have Plural Verb.

Example,

- Singular: The cat runs fast.
- Plural: The cats run fast.

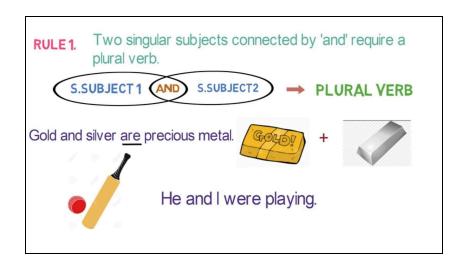


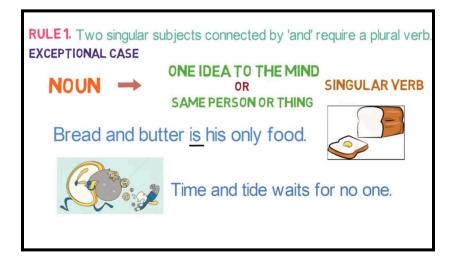


Then, we will see the six important subject-verb agreement rules, which are :

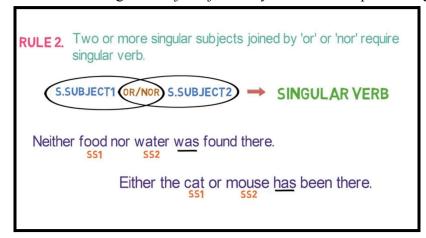
Rule 1

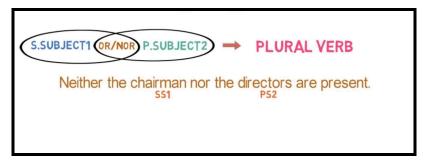
Two singular subjects connected by 'and' require a plural verb.





Rule 2
Two or more singular subjects joined by 'or' or 'nor' require a singular verb.

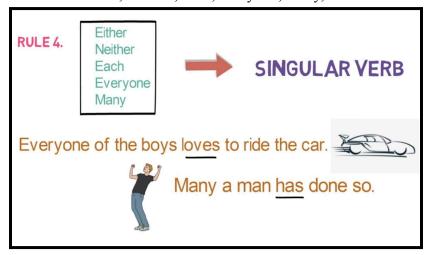




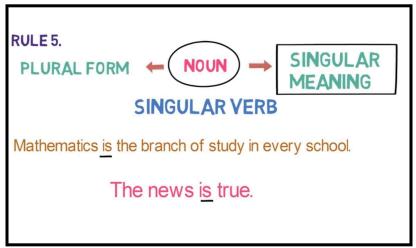
Rule 3
When the subjects joined by 'or' or 'nor' are of different persons, the verb agrees with the nearer.



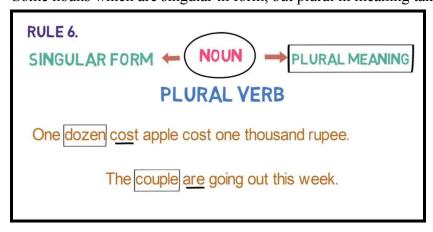
Rule 4
Words like Either, Neither, each, everyone, many, must be followed by a singular verb.



Rule 5
Some nouns which are plural in form, but singular in meaning take a singular verb.



Rule 6
Some nouns which are singular in form, but plural in meaning take a plural verb.

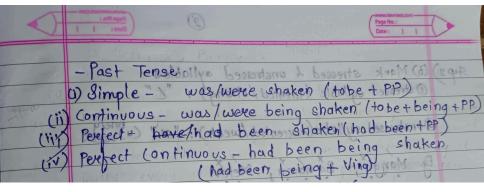

Direct Speech

Direct speech involves quoting the exact words spoken by a person. It is enclosed in quotation marks.

Examples:

- 1. John said, "I am going to the park."
- 2. Mary asked, "Will you join me for dinner?"

<u>Indirect Speech</u>

Indirect speech (also known as reported speech) conveys the meaning of what was said without quoting the exact words. It does not use quotation marks.

Examples:

- 1. John said that he was going to the park.
- 2. Mary asked if I would join her for dinner.

Direct speech quotes the exact words spoken, while indirect speech conveys the meaning in a more narrative form. Changing between the two involves adjusting pronouns, tenses, time expressions, and question formats, and removing or adding quotation marks as needed. Practice with a variety of sentences can help solidify these concepts.

Rules for Converting Direct to Indirect Speech

- 1. Change of Pronouns:
 - Direct: "I am tired," she said.
 - Indirect: She said that she was tired.
- 2. Change of Tense:
 - Simple Present to Simple Past: "I eat breakfast," he said.
 - He said that he ate breakfast.
 - Present Continuous to Past Continuous: "I am studying," she said.
 - She said that she was studying.
 - Present Perfect to Past Perfect: "I have finished," he said.
 - He said that he had finished.
- 3. Change of Time Expressions:
 - "today" changes to "that day"
 - "tomorrow" changes to "the next day" or "the following day"
 - "yesterday" changes to "the day before" or "the previous day"
- 4. Removing Quotation Marks:
 - Direct: "I will be late," he said.
 - Indirect: He said that he would be late.
- 5. Changing Question Formats:
 - Yes/No Questions: Change the structure and remove the question mark.
 - Direct: "Are you coming?" she asked.
 - Indirect: She asked if I was coming.
- Wh- Questions: Use the same question word (who, what, where, etc.), and adjust the sentence structure.
 - Direct: "Where do you live?" he asked.

- Indirect: He asked where I lived.

Examples for Practice

Direct to Indirect:

8.Question Tags

Question tags are short questions added to the end of a statement to confirm or check information.

Examples:

- Positive Statement + Negative Tag: "You're coming to the party, aren't you?"
- Negative Statement + Positive Tag: "She doesn't like coffee, does she?"

Rules:

- 1. If the statement is positive, use a negative tag:
 - "You are coming, aren't you?"
- 2. If the statement is negative, use a positive tag:
 - "He isn't ready, is he?"

Common Tags:

- Isn't it? (for statements ending in "is")
- Don't they? (for statements ending in "do" or "does")
- Can't you? (for statements ending in "can")

9. Transformation of Sentences-Simple, Compound, and Complex Sentences:

- 1. Simple Sentences
- Contains a single independent clause.
- Example: "She reads books."

2. Compound Sentences

- Contains two or more independent clauses joined by a conjunction (and, but, or, so).
- Example: "She reads books, and he writes stories."

3. Complex Sentences

- Contains one independent clause and at least one dependent clause.
- Example: "She reads books because she enjoys them."

Transformation Examples:

Simple to Compound:

- Simple: "He was tired."
- Compound: "He was tired, so he went to bed early."

Compound to Complex:

- Compound: "I wanted to go out, but it was raining."
- Complex: "Although it was raining, I wanted to go out."

Complex to Simple:

- Complex: "If you study hard, you will pass the exam."
- Simple: "Studying hard ensures passing the exam."

Practice:

Unit 2 : Reading Skills: Comprehension (Unseen Passage)

To effectively tackle unseen passages, focus on acquiring and honing the following skills:

1.Reading with Fluency and Speed

Objective: Read smoothly and quickly to grasp the general idea of the passage without getting bogged down by individual words.

Tips:

- Practice Regularly: Read various texts to build speed and comprehension.
- Avoid Subvocalization: Try not to "speak" the words in your head; instead, focus on visualizing and understanding.
- Use a Pointer: Use your finger or a pen to guide your eyes, which can help maintain pace.

2. Skimming and Scanning

Objective: Efficiently locate and understand key points and details in the passage.

Skimming:

- Purpose: Get an overview of the main ideas.
- Method: Read the title, subheadings, the first and last paragraphs, and the first sentence of each paragraph. Look for keywords and main ideas.

Scanning:

- Purpose: Find specific information or details quickly.
- Method: Move your eyes quickly across the text to find keywords or phrases related to the information you need. Ignore other texts.

Example Practice:

- Skimming: Read a passage to summarize its main idea in a few sentences.
- Scanning:Look for a date or a name in a text without reading everything.

3. Identifying Relevant Information

Objective: Determine which details or points are crucial for answering questions or understanding the passage.

Tips:

- Highlight or Note Key Information: As you read, underline or make notes of important details.

- Look for Repetition: Repeated words or phrases often indicate important information.
- Check Context: Ensure the information is relevant to the main topic or theme of the passage.

Example Practice:

- Read a passage and list the main points or significant details that answer specific questions.

4. Isolating Fact from Opinion

Objective: Distinguish between objective information and subjective views.

Facts: Verifiable pieces of information or evidence.

- Example: "The Earth orbits the Sun."

Opinions:Personal beliefs, interpretations, or judgments.

- Example: "I think space travel is the most exciting field of science."

Tips:

- Look for Evidence: Facts are often supported by data or evidence, while opinions are often expressed with phrases like "I believe," "in my opinion," or "it seems."

Example Practice:

- Read a passage and categorize sentences into facts or opinions.

5. Understanding Concepts and Arguments

Objective: Grasp the underlying ideas, themes, and arguments presented in the passage. Tips:

- Identify Main Ideas: Determine the primary message or argument of the passage.
- Look for Supporting Details: Find evidence or examples that support the main ideas.
