Punctuality and regularity

Punctuality and regularity will help you become a better person in future. Here are some ways in which you can learn to be punctual and regular in whatever you are doing.

1. Attend school everyday of the week.
2. Always think of the time and day you should do something.
3. Submit your class work and homework to the teacher on time.
4. Participate in class activities.

Reward for obedience

Pupils who obey rules could be rewarded in the following ways:

1. Being praised by the teacher and the head teacher.
2. Being given a prize by the school.
3. Being respected by the teachers and other pupils.

Reward for disobedience

1. Those who disobey rules may get punished by the teacher.
2. They would be noted specially for disobedience (by the teachers and pupils)
3. The teacher would report them to their parents.
4. They may be sent away from school.

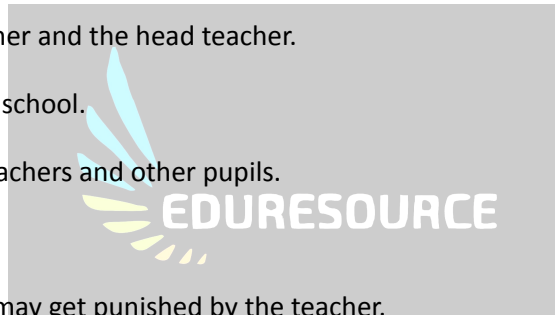

Duties of class monitors and prefects

1. They keep the class neat and tidy. When the class is tidy, we will be comfortable and then we will learn new things easily.
2. They clean the chalkboard. When the chalkboard is clean, it will be easy for the teacher to write on it, and we will see it clearly.
3. They stop noise making in the class. We will learn better when the class is quiet.
4. They help the teacher to organize the class. For example, they distribute books, pencils, crayons and such things. They also collect our books when we finish our work. Sometimes, they arrange our books on the shelves.
5. They report disobedient pupils to the school authorities.
6. They make sure other pupils are orderly.
7. They make sure that the school compound is neat.

Qualities of class monitors and prefects

1. They are hardworking.

3. They are regular in school.

6. They are disciplined.

Content



The community

A community is made up of a group of people. They live close to each other in a place. They obey rules and regulations.

Types of communities

1. Traditional communities. Examples are villages and small towns. They are sometimes ruled by traditional rulers. The people know each other
2. Modern communities. Examples are large towns and cities. Most of the people do not know each other very well. The communities are ruled by government officials. The people use modern equipment, like machines, and cars.
3. The school community: The school is also a community. We spend a lot of our time there. Sometimes, pupils live in a part of the school called a boarding house or a hostel. People in the school community are always learning new things. The head teacher is the leader of the school community

Members of the community

1. In families, we have father, mother, children, uncles, aunts, cousins, grandparents and others.
2. In the community, we have leaders like the obas, obis and emirs who see to the welfare of the community. We also have chairmen of local government councils and other government officials. Of course, we also have members of the community.
3. In the school, we have the head teacher, other teachers, the pupils, and other people who help to look after the school. Some of such people are secretaries, gardeners, cleaners and sometimes, cooks.

Rules in the community

Members who live together have rules and regulations that they obey. If people obey rules and regulations, they will be happy. If people disobey, the community will not make good progress. Rules are made to promote orderliness, cooperation, happiness of all, respect and loyalty. Here are examples of some community rules:

1. Keep the environment clean.
2. Do not loiter in the streets at night.
3. Security guards must lock the street gates at midnight.
4. Street gates should be opened at 5 a.m.

Keeping our surroundings clean

Sanitation

What is a toilet?

A toilet is a place where people pass waste.

Types of toilets

We have traditional and modern toilets.

1. Traditional toilets include:

(a) The pit toilet

(b) The bucket toilet

(c) The bush

2. Modern toilets are the kind of toilets which people use these days. Modern toilets are mostly found in large towns and cities. Some people call the modern toilet 'the water system'.

Ways of keeping modern toilets clean

1. Flush the toilet after every use.

2. Clean the toilet everyday.

3. Use disinfectants to clean the toilet.

4. Do not stand on the toilet seat.

5. Mop the floors and brush the ceiling.

6. When the toilet gets faulty, call the plumber immediately.

7. When the septic tank gets filled up, ask the sanitation workers to clear it.

Things for cleaning the toilet: broom, toilet brush, detergent, water, and disinfectant
