Writing Prompts

- What's something you know more about than almost anyone?
- What's something most people in the EA community don't know?
- What's something most people in the EA community are wrong about?
- What's something about EA that confuses you?
- Where did you most recently donate? What led you to make that decision?
- Have you ever hired anyone? What would you tell someone who wanted to apply for the kind of job you hired for?
- What have you learned about during your career that people in EA should know about?
- Have you tried to explain EA to anyone recently? How did it go? Were there certain frames/phrasings that you would or wouldn't recommend, based on your experience?
- Have you read any good books/articles about EA-adjacent topics lately? What did you learn that other people here should know?
 - Is there something you want to learn about? Ask people for recommended resources!
- What have you been talking about in all your meetings this weekend?
- What's a cause area or intervention you don't know has been written about, that you wish someone *would* write about? (There's a <u>thread</u> for sharing that sort of thing.)



Some thoughts on writing posts

Before you publish: Try printing your post out on paper and reading it out loud to yourself. These are both ways to make familiar text seem new again, which makes it easier to catch things that your eyes may have skimmed past many times on a screen.

Before you publish: Write a brief summary of the key points of your post (a few sentences or bullet points) and put it at the top of the post. This lets readers more easily figure out whether they want to invest time in reading the post, and lets you draw attention to a few key points (action items, counterintuitive ideas, etc.)

After you publish: Are there any questions you'd like readers to answer for you? If so, try putting each question in a separate comment at the end of the post. That makes it easier to coordinate discussion around certain questions.



Notes on Forum readership

The new Forum was launched on a different website in mid-November 2018, so I've used pageview data from October 2018 for the old website. All data after that comes from the new website.

Also, while the Forum opened to the community in 2013, I currently only have access to Analytics data from mid-2014 and on.

Forum user JimmyJ collected <u>statistics</u> on user registrations and new posts from the beginning of the Forum through mid-2019.

EA Forum articles have been linked to by Marginal Revolution (may be the most popular economics/generally "intellectual" blog on the Internet) at least six times — mostly in "daily links" posts, but once with a post about <u>Luisa Rodriguez's writing on nuclear war</u>, and once with a post about <u>Will MacAskill's idea for a new voting system</u>.
