

Instructional Framework Rubric

An Instructional Framework is a district's vision and roadmap for achieving high-quality, equitable (on-grade-level) instruction for all students in a specific content area. To be effective, an Instructional Framework must be clear, concise, practical, and above all, RBIS-aligned.

The rubric below is designed to outline the characteristics of an effective Instructional Framework.

- Formatting:** Visually appealing format; at minimum, includes district logo and may also include purposeful graphics or visuals
- Language:** Clear, concise, user-friendly language throughout
