Frog habitats

Different species of frogs live in different habitats. A habitat is the natural place where an animal lives. Many frogs live in forests—especially rain forests. A rain forest is a hot, thick forest in a tropical region. Rain forests receive at least 80 inches (203 cm) of rain each year. Some frogs live

in grasslands and in deserts.

Most frogs live close to water,
however. They live near creeks,
ponds, streams, and wetlands.
A wetland is an area of land
that is waterlogged, or soaked
with water, for part or all of
the year. Marshes and swamps
are two types of wetlands in
which frogs live.



Many frogs live in or near bodies of water such as lakes, rivers, ponds, and bogs. A bog is wet, muddy ground.
