The Divine Paradox: You Multiply by Giving Away

In worldly terms, giving away means losing. But in the Kingdom of God, giving away love, joy, peace, or encouragement causes increase. The more light you pour out, the more God pours in.

“You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden.” — Matthew 5:14

Light doesn't compete with light—it joins together to defeat darkness. When you help others shine, you *participate in divine multiplication*.

High-authority research from Barna Group shows that Christians who actively encourage others report higher levels of faith satisfaction and purpose.
