Writing is an important life skill. Many of our students have learned the basics of writing and are continuing to work on their writing skills daily. Some are utilizing structured <u>writing curriculums and writing classes</u> and others are working independently. At MVA, we want all of our students to become proficient writers and be able to "show what they know" in the state testing platform and in life. It's never too late or too early to learn.

On the spring SBAC ELA test, students must complete <u>one writing task</u> that demonstrates their grasp of proper writing organization, conventions and appropriate evidence usage. The ELA performance task asks students to write an essay that may be argumentative, explanatory, informational, narrative, or opinion-based. These different genres are distributed randomly in the platform by grade level.

Some genres are labeled differently based on the grade level.

For Melissa Webb's webinars:

- Persuasive covers opinion and argumentative. She explains the two as they raise the bar for all students to practice adding in the "counter-argument" or "opposing view" expected of older children. It's the only big difference between the two.
- The same is true regarding the Expository style. She teaches the difference between informational and explanatory as they raise the bar by asking all students to consider the "why" something is the way it is. That one can be trickier, though. Inference skills must be practiced to make those kinds of connections, but it opens up great discussions!
