- 3. The Common School Journal, Plan to Abolish the Board of Education, 1840
- 4. Petition of the Catholics of New York for a Portion of the Common School Fund, 1840
- 5. Petition of Negro Citizens for Integrated Schools, 1846

Debate Etiquette

Remember this is a debate. While we will strive to employ the agreed-upon norms, we are also "role playing" historic events and adopting the ideas and passions of historical groups/people. Do not be afraid to "act up" during these debates.

Reserve the following norms for classroom discussion and dialogue when we are grappling with content and sharing our individual (sometimes personal) perspectives. Here are the norms discussed at the orientation:

- Listen for understanding
- acknowledgement and validation
- be open to new and different ideas
- ask questions for clarification, but not to solve
- What is said here, stays here. What is learned here, leaves here.
- respectfully disagree and share opinions
- stay relevant and on topic
- give credit for someone else's thoughts and build on it.
- show empathy for others
- be supportive of the ideas and thoughts of others
- give affirmation and praise to ideas
