




# Photoshop: Layer Masks

1. Layer mask allows you to vary the level of transparency across a layer.
2. Layer masks use white, black and all the shades of grey in between to control the transparency of a layer. Default layer mask is filled with white. White in layer mask means 0% transparent, that's 100% visible and equals 100% opacity. Black does exactly the opposite – makes layer 100% transparent, 0% visible, just like 0% opacity. Between black and white we do have 254 shades of gray that makes a layer more or less transparent. Neutral grey (the color exactly between black and white) means 50% transparent, 50% visible.
3. Mask commands, shortcuts and tricks:
  - a. Add layer mask – press third button from the left at the bottom of layers palette.
  - b. Delete mask – right click on the mask / “Delete Layer Mask”
  - c. View mask – Alt (Option) + Left click on the mask
  - d. Disable/enable mask – Shift + Left click on the mask
  - e. Invert mask colors – Cmnd + I
  - f. Move mask from one layer to another – select, drag and drop to the other layer
  - g. Copy mask from one layer to another – Cmnd + Left click on the mask, then select the other layer and click “Add Layer Mask” button
4. To delete layer mask:
  - a. Select mask > Properties > trash icon at bottom
  - b. Ctrl Click Mask thumbnail > delete layer mask
5. Properties Panel
  - a. With a mask selected, open the Properties Panel (Window > Properties). This is another way to access Mask options. It includes a Feather slider which will soften the edge of the Mask by specific number of pixels.
6. Unlink/Link Layer Mask
  - a. By default, a layer or group is linked to its layer mask or vector mask, as indicated by the link icon  between the thumbnails in the Layers panel. The layer and its mask move together in the image when you move either one with the Move tool . Unlinking them lets you move them independently and shift the mask's boundaries separately from the layer.
    - i. To unlink a layer from its mask, click the link icon in the Layers panel.
    - ii. To reestablish the link between a layer and its mask, click between the layer and mask path thumbnails in the Layers panel.
7. For easier editing of a layer mask, you can display the grayscale mask by itself or as a rubylith overlay on the layer.
  - a. In the Layers panel, do one of the following:

- b. Option-click the layer mask thumbnail to view only the grayscale mask. To redisplay the layers, Option-click the layer mask thumbnail. Alternatively, click the eye icon  in the Properties panel.
- c. Hold down Option+Shift, and click the layer mask thumbnail to view the mask on top of the layer in a rubylith masking color. Hold down Option+Shift, and click the thumbnail again to turn off the color display.
