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#### **Abstract**

The abstract should be written in single spacing, using 12 pt Calibri Light font, and consist of 150–250 words. It is not intended to serve as an “introduction” or a summary of the conclusion. Rather, it should cover — though not be limited to — the following elements: (1) the central research question and the background context of the topic; (2) the author’s research stance or perspective; (3) the approach or method used to examine the issue; and (4) the key findings and core arguments presented in the article. Additional significant aspects of the study that meaningfully support the overall findings may also be included, bearing in mind the word limit.

#### **Introduction**

Please use Calibri Light, size 12, single spacing, and avoid adding any space before or after paragraphs. It is recommended not to apply specific formatting styles throughout your text. Keep the formatting minimal, except when you need to emphasize certain terms or phrases. Use *italics* for all non-English words. Arabic terms must follow the transliteration system adopted by the *National Journal of Legal Inquiry (NJLI)*, which can be downloaded as a PDF.

This part of the article should elaborate on the background of your study, particularly the gap between the normative aspect (*law in the books*) and the empirical reality (*law in action*), while clearly positioning your research in the context of other studies on similar topics. A proper literature review is required, focusing on the most recent and relevant academic works published in reputable journals.

To guide your writing, consider addressing two key questions: First, why is your research question important and worth exploring? Second, how does your study respond to or differ from previous research, and what contribution does it make to the current academic discourse?

While you are not required to provide a detailed explanation of your research method in this section, you may briefly mention it if deemed necessary. You may also conclude this introduction with a brief outline of your discussion structure and the anticipated key findings.

### **The First Aspect of the Discussion, as the Second Section**

In this section, you should explore each aspect of the issue in detail. It is essential to build your argument systematically, supported by original data that is discussed in relation to existing scholarly works. In other words, the discussion should integrate data presentation and analysis, rather than separating them into distinct sections. Describing data without analysis is not recommended.

All quotations must be clearly marked to distinguish them from the author's own text. Each quotation must be followed by a reference, cited using the in-text citation style based on the **Chicago Manual of Style 17th Edition (author-date format)**. The same applies when paraphrasing ideas from other authors—citations must be included after each relevant sentence or paragraph.

If the source is a book, cite it in the following format: (Author Year, page). For subsequent references to the same source, you may use abbreviated versions such as (Author, Short Title, page). If the source includes volumes, specify the volume number as well. Examples of other types of sources include journal articles (Author Year), websites (Author/Organization Year), legal documents (e.g., Law Number/Year), court decisions (Court Name Year), interviews (Interviewee Name, interview by Author, Date), book chapters, and dissertations. For online sources, include the full URL and the date you accessed the page (e.g., <https://...> accessed on July 15, 2025).

### **The Third Aspect of the Discussion, and so on**

You may include more sections in your article as necessary. Each section can be divided into sub-sections, formatted using a numbered list, as shown in the example below.

#### ***Sub-Section as Part of its Parent Section***

There is no need to apply special indentation when writing the body text under a sub-section heading. The content should follow the standard formatting used throughout the article.

#### ***Another Sub-Section***

Although the addition of further sub-headings within an existing sub-section may be considered, it is generally discouraged. Authors are advised to present their arguments and explanations in a coherent and well-organized narrative format. Similarly, the use of listing formats or bullet points in this part of the discussion is not recommended.

### ***Figure and Other Illustrations***

If your article requires the use of tables, figures, images, or other visual elements, please submit them as high-resolution files attached to your main submission. However, we strongly encourage authors to convert such visual materials into descriptive narratives whenever possible, and to minimize or avoid including images within the article itself.
