BLAINE LAKE, Sask. — Saskatchewan Doukhobors and first nations residents celebrated Tuesday as the Olympic torch continued its journey across Canada.

In Blaine Lake, a small community about 85 kilometres north of Saskatoon, the Doukhobor descendants of early 1900s Russian migrants dressed in traditional costume to greet the relay runners.



Many Doukhobors settled in the rural area, said Mae Popoff [photo right], who was dressed in a long traditional dress and a head scarf and carried a plate with <u>bread, salt and water</u>, which represents "toil and a peaceful life."

The Doukhobors were joined by first nations leader Cliff Tawpisin, who wore his traditional feathered bonnet to the Olympic celebration

Saskatchewan Doukhobors and First Nations residents celebrated on tuesday as the torch continued its journey across Canada.

Organizers paid tribute to the history of the community with an appearance of Doukhobor people in traditional dress.

The Doukhobors were an ethnic group that came from Russia in the early 1900's to settle the West, enticed by the promise of free land. They settled in the Blaine Lake area and today there are about 80 Doukhobors still left in the community, said Mae Popoff who now lives in Saskatoon.

The group believes in peace, said Popoff, who was dressed in traditional dress and a head scarf and carried a plate with bread, salt and water which represents "toil and peaceful life.
