Kindergarten and First Grade

In third grade, students have been playing boomwhackers, and currently they are learning some folk dances and folk songs including I'se the B'y, which is a



Newfoundland folk song/sea shanty. They recently learned about Trombone Shorty, a jazz trombone player, and then played his song, "Where Y'at" on boomwhackers.

Composer of the Month

Each month in music class we have been learning about a different composer from around the world! This month we "met" Arvo Pärt from Estonia, who is our first living composer. The students learned a bit about Pärt's musical style, called *Tintinnabuli*, which translates from Latin to "ringing of the bells." For our final composer we will be "meeting" Chen Yi, who is another living composer. Students have enjoyed "visiting" the places that each

composer is from by looking at pictures, and also hearing the composers' music! So far we have visited eleven locations, as some of the composers lived in multiple countries.

Musical Share Week

Musical share week was a success!! All classes had many instruments and musical items from home to share, and those friends that didn't bring anything from home got to use an instrument from the music room to create their own song. This is my favorite week in music class, because I love seeing the students so engaged in sharing what they brought to their classmates. We also practiced speaking in front of an audience, performing in front of an audience, taking a bow or curtsy to thank the audience, and being respectful, responsible audience members!
