

- 3 -2 Mixed Conditional
 - Functions
 - Used to reference a hypothetical, impossible situation in the past to comment on a present, general state.
 - If I had drunk less wine last night, I would feel great now.
 - Structure
 - Regular
 - “If/When” Clause + “Main” Clause
 - “If/When” Clause
 - ‘If’ + Subject + ‘Had’ + Past Participle + A comma (,)
 - If he had studied more,
 - “Main” Clause
 - Subject + ‘Would/Could/Should’ + Bare Infinitive
 - He would pass the exam.
 - If he had studied more, he would pass the exam.
 - Question
 - Follow the same structure for the “If/When” Clause and make the “Main” Clause a question.
 - If he had studied more, would he pass the exam?
 - Contractions
 - Had
 - I had = I’d
 - You had = You’d
 - He had = He’d
 - She had = She’d
 - It had = It’d
 - We had = We’d
 - They had = They’d
 - Would
 - I would = I’d
 - You would = You’d
 - He would = He’d
 - She would = She’d
 - It would = It’d
 - We would = We’d
 - They would = They’d
 - Negative
 - To make the ‘If Clause’ negative, treat it like the Past Perfect Tense.
 - To make the ‘Main Clause’ negative, add ‘Not’ to ‘Would/Could/Should’
 - The important thing is that it makes sense.
 - If you had not broken your leg, we would be on holiday now.

- If you had woken me up, I wouldn't have been late for work.

- Contractions

- Had not = Didn't
- Would not = Wouldn't
- Should not = Shouldn't
- Could not = Couldn't

- Inversion

- The clauses can be inverted and still carry the same meaning. This is done by switching the "If/When" Clause and the "Main" Clause and getting rid of the comma.
 - If I had eaten lunch, I would not be hungry.
 - I would not be hungry if I had eaten lunch.
