An ASUCD Senate Resolution to contact Department Heads, the Academic Senate, and other academic contacts to urge leniency for issuing Permission to Drop (PTD) numbers throughout Spring Quarter 2020 in light of the impact that COVID-19 has had on course structure.

WHEREAS, the Coronavirus, or COVID-19 pandemic has led to the creation and implementation of UC-wide policies that aimed to prevent and reduce its impact across the UC campuses; and,

WHEREAS, UC Davis, along with its sister UC campuses, have moved all in-person instruction online for Spring Quarter 2020¹; and,

WHEREAS, this decision has left all students uncertain about the nature of instruction for the foreseeable future, impacting strongly the transfer students, non-traditional students, students of color, former foster youth students, and student parents²; and,

WHEREAS, many students depend on the tutoring services offered on campus, which have also been impacted by the UC-wide policies; and,

WHEREAS, many students depend on IT services offered on campus, which include but are not limited to free wifi and computer services, which have also been impacted by the UC-wide policies; and,

WHEREAS, this resolution recognizes and commends the Academic Senate for extending the Pass/No Pass option for classes till the tenth week of Spring Quarter; and,

WHEREAS, many reentry and non-traditional students are of the age that the Coronavirus jeopardizes their livelihood—many live in dense housing conditions that restrict their movements and force them to isolate; and,

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WHEREAS, foster youth and formerly incarcerated students come from traumatic experiences where any further social isolation will not allow them to academically function. Many are, at this point, forced to isolate with toxic home environments not suitable for learning. Universities were a safe place of learning for the community; and,

WHEREAS, student parents cannot be asked to take care of a whole family and simultaneously keep up with the demands of being a full time student at UC Davis; and,

WHEREAS, student parents have the additional burden of adjusting to the closure of K-12 schools, as they need to find childcare alternatives; and,

WHEREAS, these populations intersect with mental health issues—many use Disabled Student Program (DSP) accommodations. These conditions will only exacerbate mental health issues, not allowing students to perform; and,

WHEREAS, students may begin the quarter believing they can manage their spring quarter schedule, but may face other unforeseeable difficulties throughout the quarter that may prevent them from being successful and result in dropping the course later in the quarter; and,

WHEREAS, while the leniency of choosing Pass/No Pass is beneficial to the student body, there is a necessity for further adjustments as students are transitioning to online courses; and,

WHEREAS, this time of uncertainty calls for empathy, flexibility, and adjustments because we can no longer adhere to strict policies and rules for something so unpredictable; and,

WHEREAS, due to course logistics, constant restructuring of assignments, syllabi and course expectations throughout the quarter, students should be given the leniency to drop their courses throughout the quarter if they need to; and,

WHEREAS, currently, UC Davis students are allowed to drop/add classes until the tenth (10th) or twentieth (20th) day of instruction, depending on the course; and,

WHEREAS, University of California, Los Angeles, has implemented flexibility by dropping the associated, "Late fees for add, drop, grading basis change, registration, study list, and variable unit change" for the entirety of Spring Quarter 2020; and,

WHEREAS, the UC Davis Office of the Registrar should ensure that course adjustment fees, registration charges, and other associated late fees are appropriately waived should students need to drop their classes.

THEREFORE LET IT BE RESOLVED THAT, ASUCD urges the Academic Senate to take a lenient stance regarding the Permission to Drop (PTD) notices; and,

THEREFORE LET IT BE RESOLVED THAT, ASUCD urges the Academic Senate to address and outline leniency guidelines in regards to the Permission to Drop (PTD) numbers and should send this out to each college leadership; and,

THEREFORE LET IT BE RESOLVED THAT, ASUCD urges all college leadership to pass this information to staff and faculty and ensure this is the norm that is practiced across the board; and,

THEREFORE LET IT BE FURTHER RESOLVED THAT, ASUCD urges the Academic Senate to waive any fees associated with changing course actions; and.


