




Reading:

Reading Strategy - Self Questioning - I wonder...?


<u>Before you start reading Chapter 3</u> - Dark is Fun or the next section you are on ask yourself some Wonder Questions - e.g. I wonder will Plop learn how to land properly in this chapter? I wonder will he stop being afraid of the dark in this chapter? **What is your Wonder question?**



Now read the 1st three pages of Chapter 3. Make a list of any new words and if you don't understand them look them up in a dictionary or ask an adult.

Maths [Subtraction]:

- 1. Play train game [https://www.topmarks.co.uk/maths-games/mental-maths-train Select addition and then subtraction choose levels as appropriate.
- Discuss the words 'less, greater and fewer'. Put these into word problems and ask children to answer. The most important thing to know by the end of this lesson is what the terms fewer, more and greater mean and identifying how to use this knowledge in a question.

Barn Owl

Some barn owls are nocturnal but also they can be seen at sunset or early morning. They have a white, heart-shaped face and a white chest with small brown spots. Their back is tawny, marked with black and white spots. They are a similar size to a small cat.

Fascinating Facts

Barn owls make a screeching noise, not a hoot like the tawny

Baby owls are called owlets.

Where Do They Live?

Barn owls live in a range of habitats including farm buildings, dovecotes, church towers, hollow trees and cliff sites. Some owls prefer to live in the open grasslands, farmlands and woodlands that are no more than 2,000 metres high. Some of these



species are also found along the edges of woods.

What do they eat?

Barn owls eat mainly small mammals like voles, shrews, rats and mice. Sometimes they eat birds, insects and even frogs. On average, a wild barn owl eats about 4 small mammals per night, that's 1,460 per year.

Staying Safe

If they feel threatened, they will squint their eyes, spread their wings and sway their head back and forth, while hissing. If this does not stop their attacker, the barn owl will lie on its back and protect itself with its sharp talons.


Wednesday [Tens and Units];




