	What is this? What is it for?
504 PLAN	Non-legally binding outline of accommodations to help a student with a disability access education. Often used for kids with ADHD – for example, to allow seating in the front of the classroom to facilitate attention.
	School may ask for a <u>letter to document disability</u> and recommend accommodations. (see PPC DBP page for a <u>list of potential</u> accommodations, by condition)
IEP	Legally binding plan for special education services. The IEP is developed after an initial evaluation to determine eligibility for special education and identify specific needs.
	Parent can submit a written request for assessment for eligibility for an IEP.
Applied Behavioral Analysis Therapy (ABA)	Therapy involving careful observation and gradual shaping of behavior to optimize function.
	Usually used for patients with autism. Patients with Health Plan of Mateo who have ADHD with severe behavioral difficulty may be eligible for ABA
Occupational therapy (OT)	Typically recommended to address fine motor deficits, sensory difficulty, or difficulty with ADLs.
	Schools may provide OT relevant to school functioning (e.g. holding a pencil, cutting with scissors) as part of IEPs
Feeding therapy	Specific type of OT. Sometimes under Speech therapy.
	Helps address oral aversion, texture sensitivity specific to eating
Physical therapy (PT)	In context of developmental delay, usually recommended to address gross motor deficits
Speech therapy	Addresses speech/language delay or disorders. Patients may need/want community-based speech referrals if they are not receiving adequate speech support through school
