A quote from the article gave scientific evidence of VR in helping achieve this “The power of VR to stoke empathy is the focus of research at Stanford’s Virtual Human Interaction Lab, led by communications professor Jeremy Bailenson. In the lab’s “Empathy at Scale” studies, young people who “wear” an elderly avatar, for example, are then more inclined to save for retirement.* Some other studies have found that embodying avatars of other races can reduce racial bias” (Berdik 2017).
