

<u>Gustar and Similar Verbs (Ch.9c1).</u> Indirect object pronouns are used most frequently with indirect transitive verbs like "gustar". We have already seen, in summary, some of *gustar's* uses:

<u>Person</u>	<u>"like" verb</u>	What is liked?	<b>Explanation</b>

What's above is somewhat misleading however, because as you now know, me, for example, does not really mean I, rather, it means  $to/for\ me$ . So when we say,  $Me\ gusta\ chocolate$ , we aren't really saying,  $I\ like\ chocolate$ . In actuality, we are saying,  $Chocolate\ appeals\ to\ me$ . We could just as easily have written this statement:  $Chocolate\ me\ gusta$ . By the same token, when saying,  $Nos\ gustan\ deportes$ , we are really saying,  $Sports\ appeal\ to\ us$ .

In order to clarify a sentence, sometimes it's important to add a prepositional phrase.	<ul> <li>Le gusta bailar. → A David le gusta bailar.</li> <li>or</li> <li>Le gusta bailar a David.</li> </ul>
Sometimes adding a prepositional phrase is simply used to emphasize the indirect object pronoun.	A mí, me gusta viajar, pero a ti, no te gustan los aeropuertos.

	Keep in mind that $me$ is emphasized by $(a mi)$ and $te$ is emphasized by $(a ti)$ . The other pronouns are simply made into a prepositional phrase for emphasis or clarification (e.g., $usted \rightarrow a usted$ ; $nosotros \rightarrow a nosotros$ ; $ellos \rightarrow a ellos$ ), etc.
Indirect object pronouns must be used with gustar even when a clarifying prepositional phrase is employed.	Correct: Le gusta viajar. Correct: Le gusta viajar a ella. Incorrect: A ella gusta viajar.
To talk about what someone <i>would like</i> to do, use an <u>indirect object</u> , <i>gustaría</i> and a <u>verb</u> .	Me <b>gustaría</b> trabajar en el hospital, pero a mi amigo Jorge, <u>le <b>gustaría</b> trabajar</u> en la universidad.
There are many verbs in Spanish that function like <i>gustar</i> :	Me interesa estudiar la administración de empresas.
interesar: to interest	Nos fascina la gente Maya.
fascinar: to fascinate molestar: to bother encantar: to love	¿Te molesta leer Shakespeare?
encumum. to tove	Les encanta comer en restaurantes.
