- How is it that you can solve excessive shedding, itching, anxiety, eating poop, hot spots, bad breath, bad gas, sensitive skin or a dozen more problems by merely changing their food?

If you'll give me about 10-15 minutes of your time, I might be able to help you shift the entire trajectory of the next decade with your dog. Let me explain, would you?

Have you ever watched that documentary called "Food Inc" on Netflix? If not, it is a REAL eye-opener! It goes behind-the-scenes of how the Big 5 food companies make our food and how they stuff it with all kinds of toxic

junk for various reasons (and so it's making us all sick and fat and tired). It even shows how they are messing with the soil so badly that our "clean veggies" aren't so clean anymore and are hardly even nutritious due to how they've stripped the good nutrients from the soil over decades of industrial farming.

Really - it's very alarming to say the least!

Watching it, I was truly disgusted. I was new to all this info so I could <u>not</u> believe how our food was being made, the shady ways of profiting or how poorly the animals/soil are treated, etc. I just couldn't believe any of it...except to then find out that I was 2 decades late to the party and that there are dozens and dozens of documentaries nowadays that expose all the same stuff and more so.

Years later, I got into training dogs. I figured that training dogs and dog nutrition were two separate things that had nothing to do with each other so I didn't really get into learning much about it. Then, I accidentally stumbled into researching dog food and how the big dog food brands were putting the EXACT SAME toxic fillers in our dog food too. Ugh!

Just like the human food industries, the top dog food companies use tricky marketing like colorful food bags, photos of gorgeous dogs with shiny coats and bright eyes, at low costs and boasting in all the "chicken, beef and duck" that they put in their dog food just to sell you their bag on the cheap-cheap at ridiculous prices...but hidden in most of those foods are cheap, low-quality and downright *dangerous* ingredients (that I'll get into in just a minute).

Ugh! Angry face. I was so mad and disgusted and sorry. It was like I was watching "Dog Food Inc."

I couldn't believe that I had spent so much time and money and energy on the best dog I had ever had....only to find out that I was feeding her the worst ingredients available....even at \$80 a bag, thinking that it was the good stuff just because it was made by a popular, expensive brand. Sheesh!

The truth is that this profit-first mindset from the big dog food brands means that their primary goal is to maximize their profits by selling as much of their products as they can, no matter what they actually put in that dog food nor what they have to promise to get us to buy it!

That is, our growing pup's nutrition and development is NOT their primary concern.

After my jolting wake-up call, I went to the local dog suppliers looking for organic dog food...and raw dog food (read: butcher-chopped beef, chicken and duck just like we'd eat)...and the science-y brands that the vets recommended.

And to be sure, while it's super tricky to find them, there are plenty of good products out there if you know what to look for and what to avoid...But then I ran into this lady who worked for a company that blew my mind.

She told me about a dog *health food* company that made all-natural, holistic products, designed by a team of vets and dog nutritionists with the dog's growth and development and energy needs in mind NO MATTER what stage of life they are in.

Can I Trust My Vet/Breeder For What They Recommend? Maybe.

Like with anything else, you'll need to discern their recommendations against the standards of good nutrition as we lay out in this guide.

VETS - The truth is that many vets were won over in vet school when the big brands threw parties for them, or as the reps cater lunch for the vet clinic staff almost <u>daily</u>, or the profits they get by selling/recommending the most expensive "science" dog foods.

BREEDERS - As for breeders, they often have FAR too many dogs living with them to feed to be able to afford the best dog foods, so they will very often buy *muuuch* cheaper dog food just to get all the dogs and puppies fed, and then will recommend that <u>exact</u> same low-quality brand to their puppy buyers so that the new dog owner won't try to return the dog next week when it's pooping liquid and thinking it's sick (when really the upset tummy is merely caused by the sudden change in diet).

So let me ask you: When you were picking up your puppy, how many doggie mouths did they have to feed to keep all those dogs fed?

Also: How many times was your vet fed this week by a dog food brand?

This goes to show you that just because your vet/breeder recommends a dog food, doesn't mean that it's actually the best because they have ulterior motives too, so just be careful and research it, just as you would anything else.

Why Waste Good Money on Dog Nutrition Anyways? Well....

- The typical family will spend about **\$500** on a puppy or new dog in the first year for the shots, beds, bowls, leashes, etc...unless it was a pure breed, and in that case, you can often add another \$1000-2000 on top of that.
- Over the 10-15 year lifetime of a dog, the average dog costs over \$15,000 with all of the food (\$300-1300), vet bills (\$700/yr), grooming (\$25-1000/yr), toys & treats (\$30-250/yr) and none of this figures in dog training, emergencies, dog sitters, doggie daycare, supplements, or replacement dog gear like crates, collars, car seats, etc as things get worn out, destroyed, etc.

Ok, ok, so \$15,000 is not as much as saving for a down payment on a big house or fancy college tuition, but a study in the UK found that 98% of dog owners DRASTICALLY under-estimated the total cost of dog ownership.

So here's the question we must face off with: Why spend good money on buying a great dog and paying for excellent dog training plus all the toys and treats and cute doggie sweaters...

Only to turn around and buy the cheapest giant bag of dog food that we can find to fill their bellies...food that is filled with all of the terrible toxic filliers that they put in human foods that are causing dozens of cancers, gastrointestinal issues, growth handicaps and all the nightmares coming from the food documentaries that we watch?

That is, why do we treat our dogs with the BEST of this category, but the WORST of that category?

This might make some folks angry, but it is my opinion that if we really want "best" for our furry best friend (who has no real choice in any of these

matters and is vulnerably depending on YOU to make the right choices for him/her), then it we might consider giving them the best that we can afford in EVERY category that we can afford. That's my opinion anyways.

Now, to be sure, I'm all about saving some money or finding a good discount and socking it to the retailers who are making a pretty-nice profit on our love affair with dogs,¹ but sometimes we just have to pay the dog experts when they offer a good, quality product or service that will determine the trajectory of the life of our dog. I think that dog nutrition is one of those categories. There's just no getting around it.

The Top 2 Issues of Dog Health

The two main things that determine the foundation of good health in dogs is their DNA (nature) and their Food (nurture). This makes sense, right? It also follows that as dog owners, we only have control over <u>one</u> of the two.

Just like what you have surely read about your own health and nutrition, it makes sense that we'd say the obvious here:

- Real food is **good** for your dog,
- Chemicals and cheap ingredients are **bad** for her.

To say that another way, dog food isn't about getting the biggest bag at the cheapest price, nor is feeding your pup about merely filling her belly so that she leaves you alone and you can check off the box that you have fulfilled your duties to provide sustenance to the animals under your care.

Rather, food is an issue of fuel and getting her the right goodies to stimulate brain, bone and body development in the various stages from puppy to senior dog as well as helping them maintain focus, responsiveness and emotional energy...and if the food is tasty as well, then that is a bonus that your fur-buddy will surely appreciate.

Why You Can't Write Off Big Brands Entirely

When we say "big brands" we mean Beneful, Pedigree, lams, Purina, Hill's Science Diet, Blue Buffalo, Diamond, Royal Canin, Orijen, Wellness Natural Food for Dogs, Castor & Pollux, Eukanuba, Nutro Ultra, etc...ya know, the big guys.

Now, the thing is that these expert marketers and MBA's have learned to suck you into their sales funnel by having top-of-the-line high-quality products, middle-of-the-line "just ok" products and bottom-of-the-line "terrible-for-your-dog" products.

So just like Chevrolet, they will get their stellar reputation with vets and dog associations by their top-of-the-line Corvettes, but then will also sell Chevy Spark...HOPING that you project all of the awesome quality and high-performance of the good stuff onto the other stuff that they also sell.

So, a few conclusions:

- Most of the top brands do have a good dog food somewhere in their line-up that gives them a good reputation,
- Dozens and dozens of independent food manufactures have jumped into the market to fix the food-quality problems, and
- If you care enough to buy quality dog food, then you'll be forced to learn to read those confusing ingredients and learn the games the brands play to trick you...unless you use dogfoodadvisor.com.

Peace & Pride With No Marketing Tricks

Sorry, but we have got to point out that...

This is another reason we love PawTree so much; because they only have ONE line of products - for all breeds, for all ages and for all issues.

That is, they ONLY offer the world what is best for dogs. Period. There is no reason to be checking their labels to see if this is top or middle or bottom of the line ingredients. With them, you are just safe.

A Few Dog Food Selection Principles

1) Quality food costs a bit more.

Just like anything in life though, you get what you pay for....but there is a dichotomy here, just because it is expensive doesn't mean that it is good.

2) Almost all dog foods will require some sort of additional supplementation.

Whether it's human food, dog food or cat food, when a food is processed, a nice portion of the nutrition is cooked right out of it. PawTree's version of this is to add different flavors so that those <u>dog food toppers</u> act as both vitamin and mineral boosts as well as seasonings. Brilliant. We know of know other brand doing it like this, which requires you to not only learn dog food, but now also dog supplements.

4) Dogs Need Mostly Protein, then Fats, then Carbs...In that Order.

When reading a list of ingredients, they are listed in *descending* order based off their processed weight. This means that the first 5-10 ingredients are the most important. I thought that dogs were meat-only eating critters, but it turns out that they are actually omnivores like us and need all sorts of other vitamins and minerals that they can't get just from meat and fats. They don't really need carbs, but they can be helpful if you have a breed that has a high-drive and energy-level.

5) You Want to See a Specific Meat Listed First.

You want to see chicken or turkey or salmon, etc which is vastly different than "meat meal" (read: dead animal scraps that ironically don't actually have any protein). When meals are listed, they also need to be specific, like "turkey meal" or "chicken meal" and again not "meat meal." The same rule applies to fats. You want to see "chicken fat" and not "animal fat."

6) Avoid the Organ-Damanging, Cancer-Inducing Toxins.

Avoid...Melamine, BHA, BHT, Ethoxyquin, Propylene Gylcol, Carrageenan, soy, soy meal, white flour, farmed salmon, food dyes, corn syrup, MSG (monosodium glutamate), Sodium Hexametaphosphate, apples, Sloe berries, Sloe gin, grapes, raisins, sultanas, currants, Xylitol and Titanium Dioxide.

Remember to look at your dog treats too as Milk-Bone Gravy Bone chews, a massive popular product, just got busted putting Titanium Dioxide in their treats which cause irreparable damage to your dog's DNA. (Say it with me...."This is why we love PawTree for even treats. They are just safe for everything. No worries with PawTree."

Ingredients: Chicken (source of glucosamine), rice flour, corn gluten meal, whole grain corn, chicken by-product meal (source of glucosamine), whole grain wheat, soybean meal, beef fat naturally preserved with mixed-tocopherols, glycerin, liver flavor, calcium carbonate, mono and dicalcium phosphate, salt, caramel color, dried carrots, dried peas, potassium chloride, vitamins [vitamin E supplement, niacin (vitamin B3), vitamin A supplement, calcium pantothenate (vitamin B5), thiamine mononitrate (vitamin B1), vitamin B12 supplement, riboflavin supplement (vitamin B2), pyridoxine hydrochloride (vitamin B6), folic acid (vitamin B9), menadione sodium bisulfite complex (vitamin K), vitamin D3 supplement, biotin (vitamin B7),], minerals [zinc sulfate, ferrous sulfate, manganese sulfate, copper sulfate, calcium iodate, sodium selenite], choline chloride, l-lysine monohydrochloride, sulfur

High-Quality Dog Food

Ingredients: Deboned chicken, deboned turkey, flounder, eggs, whole Atlantic mackerel, chicken liver, turkey liver, chicken heart, turkey heart, whole Atlantic herring, dehydrated chicken, dehydrated turkey, dehydrated mackerel, dehydrated chicken liver, whole dehydrated egg, whole red lentils, whole pinto beans, whole green peas, chicken necks, chicken kidney, whole green lentils, whole navy beans, whole chickpeas, lentil fiber, chicken fat, natural chicken flavor, pollock oil, ground chicken bone, chicken cartilage, turkey cartilage, mixed tocopherols (preservative), whole

pumpkin, collard greens, whole carrots, whole apples, freeze-dried chicken liver, dried kelp, zinc proteinate, thiamine mononitrate, d-calcium pantothenate, copper proteinate, chicory root, turmeric, sarsaparilla root, althea root, rosehips, juniper berries, dried Lactobacillus acidophilus fermentation product, dried Bifidobacterium animalis fermentation product, dried Lactobacillus casei fermentation product

7) Avoid Just 4 Human Foods.

It's all just myth and pseudo-science that dogs can't eat garlic, avocados, mushrooms, rosemary or walnuts, but they absolutely should never have onions, grapes/raisins, chocolate & macadamia nuts. This might be the best guide we have found on the other common sense rules for sharing human food with your dog based on various other factors.

Human Foods that Dogs CAN Have

Here are a handful of foods that your four-legged companion can enjoy with you!

- 1) You can give some fruits you can give your pup like blueberries, pineapples, strawberries, bananas and oranges.
- 2) Cooked salmon are rich in omega-3 fatty acids.
- 3) Non-fatty chicken and beef.
- 4) Peanut Butter (no Xylitol) are high in good fats and calories.
- 5) Cheese is a great snack for dogs who are not lactose intolerant.
- 6) Eggs are rich in vitamins, minerals, and protein (Do not serve raw).
- 7) Carrots are rich in fiber, minerals, and vitamins & low in calories.

A final note for this: all of these foods should only be given in moderation. Dogs can still get sick if they have too much of any of these foods.

8) Just Because You Can't Pronounce It Doesn't Mean It Is Bad.

I used to think if I couldn't read an ingredient in the label it shouldn't go in my dogs mouth, but this isn't always the case. For example, PawTree has

an ingredient called "Fructoligosaccharides" which is hard to pronounce, but they are prebiotics necessary to feed the probiotics in the food.

9) It Takes About a Solid Week to Switch Dog Foods Well

While humans can eat whatever different foods we want day to day and not have an issue, dogs can't switch up so fast because they have sensitive digestive tracts. So when you transition foods, do it slowly by blending in the new food into the old food over a week. If their tummies are upset, then just blend it in ever slower.

10) Watch for Food Sensitivities

Aminal Biome reports that digestive and skin issues account for more than 50% of all veterinary visits, like colitis, inflammatory bowel and other disorders. This is why PawTree offers gut health supplements for pets to be healthier and improve their gut function.

If your dog is experiencing itchy skin, vomiting or diarrhea, it may be linked to an allergy that might be linked to something in their food or treats. Sometimes the reactions aren't as obvious. Hyperactivity, weight-loss, lack of energy, or even aggression can be a response to a food allergy.

Getting your dog to do an allergy test can be the best and most effective way to figure out what your dog may be allergic to, without all the trial and error.

11) Raw Diets Are Tricky.

Lots of experts say, yes, if you can afford it and handle all of the details, then go for it, while plenty of other experts say that the risks over-power the potential for reward because it's expensive, has to be done juuuust right over the entire dog's life and if you include bones, they can puncture the dog's internal organs. If you want to learn more to make the decision for yourself, we found this article very helpful.

Questions You Aren't Asking (But Maybe Should Be)

There are lots of things to consider and bring into the equation after you pick the right dog food for your pup. Things like portions, feeding schedules, allergies, etc. So below we break it all down for you and what you need to know.

Portion Control

Whether you have a puppy or a full grown dog, portion control is important. There are a handful of things that play into portion control. Things such as: age, size, goal weight, etc. Generally for this, the bag knows best. Check the back of your dog food bag and it'll let you know how much to feed based on the weight of the dog.

A big thing about this is not just checking the back of the bag, but also using a food scooper that measures how much food you are getting out. Before we talk to our clients about this, a lot of the time they are just using a cup out of the cabinet to scoop the food. This leads to incorrect portions with the dog normally getting more than they need.

Feeding Schedules

Dogs should eat at least 2x a day. For puppies, even more frequent feedings may be required. Normally it is recommended that the feedings be 10-12 hours apart.

When dogs go past 12 hours without eating, their stomach can become hyper-acidic, which can lead to nausea and vomiting of a yellow liquid. As mentioned before, the rule of thumb is to follow the feeding recommendations on the dog food label according to your dog's age & weight.

Basic Gear Needed

This may be a bit basic, but we want to cover all our bases for those of you who haven't had dogs before. So when it comes down to the basics of feeding and watering the dog, what do you need?

There are so many dog bowls out there that we don't have a standard one we recommend. If you are going to use a standard bowl, just get one you like that matches your dog. *However* if you have a dog that eats too fast, we recommend a <u>slow feeder</u>. Or if you want your dog to work for their food we recommend a <u>snuffle mat</u> or <u>feeder toy</u> (if you order the feeder toy, make sure to get the size that works best for your dog.)

As for the food scooper, you can literally just get a measuring cup and do it that way OR you can check out the one we like the most <u>here</u>.

One thing I went most of my life without getting for my dog (until knowing better) was a food-storage container. I always just kept the food in the bag and let it out and in the open, buuuut...

When I started looking into nutrition for dogs I learned that dog food can get stale and aired out like human food. So of course I got one to store my dog food. I like this one. (This is extra important if you use really fresh food like PawTree.)
