Rome (Civitavecchia), Italy

Cruises from Rome (Civitavecchia) depart year-round.

In the Eternal City of Rome, Italy you can explore some of the world's most famous churches, monuments and fountains: the Colosseum, the Sistine Chapel, Vatican City, the Spanish Steps and Trevi Fountain (toss a coin in the fountain to ensure your return). Sip cappuccino at a cafe in a piazza or window-shop among the high-fashion boutiques of Via Condotti. Rome is served by the port city of Civitavecchia, located approximately 50 miles away. Olympia (Katakolon), Greece

From the small port of Katakolon on the Ionian Coast, it's a short 30-minute drive to Olympia, where ancient Greeks came to celebrate the games. At the ruins of the sanctuary at Olympia, visitors can see the temples of Zeus and Hera, the floor of the original stadium and the Council House where athletes took the Olympic oath. A museum has a unique collection of Greek sculpture, ancient pieces of armor and bronze figurines found during the excavations. [More Info](#)

Athens (Piraeus), Greece

Cruises from Athens (Piraeus) depart from spring through fall.



Piraeus is the port to Athens -- the birthplace of Western civilization. The first stop on most excursions is the Parthenon on the hill of the Acropolis. The Acropolis also is the site of the Propylea, the Temple of the Wingless Victory, the Erechtheion and the Acropolis Museum. A drive down Syngrou Avenue offers an impressive view of the Arch of Hadrian and the Temple of Olympian Zeus. The National Archeological Museum houses a rich collection of antiquities.

Mykonos, Greece



In Greek mythology, Mykonos held the battle between Zeus and the Titans and the island was named in honor of Apollo's grandson, Mykons. Composed primarily of granite, this little town with its windmills and brilliant whitewashed houses is a photographer's dream. Many visitors spend time wandering the winding streets or browsing the boutiques. Mykonos is also renowned for its diverse nightlife and beautiful beaches. [More Info](#)

Ephesus / Kusadasi, Turkey



Ephesus was the capital of Asia Minor during the time of the Roman Empire, and now it is one of the world's most impressive and best-restored archaeological sites. Walk the marble-paved streets and see the spectacular ruins of the Temple of Hadrian, the Library of Celsus, the house where the Virgin Mary spent her last days and the amphitheater where St. Paul once preached. Kusadasi is a Turkish resort known for its extensive marina and miles of beaches, but it is famed for the ancient treasures just minutes away: Miletus and its Greco-Roman theater and Temple of Athena, Didyma and its Temple of Apollo, and

the most glorious of all, the marble city of Ephesus. [More Info](#)



Rhodes, Greece

This island is celebrated for its natural beauty and delightful climate. Its most outstanding site is the Acropolis of Lindos; take a donkey trek to the site and pass charming whitewashed cottages on the way. The island's capital city is ringed with more than two miles of 15th-century walls. Most excursions include the medieval castle and Turkish market. [More Info](#)



Santorini, Greece

Santorini embraces all that has made the Greek Islands legendary -- splendid beaches, unparalleled architecture, dramatic cliffs and quaint villages. Ride a donkey up the trail to the city of Thira or take a cable car. The views from Thira, set atop a ledge overlooking the sea, are stirring. Souda Bay, Greece

Located in western Crete, Souda Bay is a large natural harbor and strategic point for commercial and military uses. The town holds restaurants and cafes for visitors to enjoy, but the beaches can be found by taking a ferry over to Akrotiri. For those interested in the history of the island, the fortress ruins have been restored recently and show barracks, supply depots, churches, and houses. Visitors can also take a trip to the Moronis River Lagoon for great bird-watching, unique vegetation, and a chance to fish with the locals. [More Info](#)
