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Introduction:

In this book, we will discuss movies, the movie theatre, video games, and even AI all from a Biblical perspective. Along with all these topics, we first establish the proper foundation for setting up standards with entertainment. Hope you learn and enjoy reading this book.

Chapter 1:

Why Have Standards in our Movies?

The first movies and TVs were invented in the 1920s. It became a marvel of its time as people could see a completely new moving picture somewhere else.

Now, nearly 100 years later, nearly 97% of Americans have a TV in their house.

A poll done in 2023 revealed that the average American watches 5 hours of screen time a day. Sadly, screens have become a HUGE part of our everyday life taking up nearly a third of our day that we are awake.

So in response to my opening question, yes, what we watch matters to God. In the day in which we live in, screens take up a good bit of our day.

Ranging from, texts, social media, Youtube, Google, games, apps, emails, work, movies, shows, etc.!

What we watch matters as a Christian.

Proving what is acceptable unto the Lord. Ephesians 5:10

We ought never forget who we are living for. We are not living for the world, a career, or even for ourselves. We are living for the one that came down from Heaven, lived a perfect life and endured immeasurable pain and 3 days later rose from the grave. What a God we serve!

Pleasing him with our life should have utmost preeminence over anything else.

There are some things we need to recognize to understand the need of having standards in our movies.

1. The Agenda

There is an absolute wicked agenda being pushed in Hollywood.

An agenda that promotes Homosexual lifestyles as normal and good.

An agenda that is Anti-God and Anti-Church.

An agenda that scoffs at Jesus, the Bible, and righteousness.

An agenda that mocks the family unit.

An agenda that promotes immoral lifestyles and behaviour.

An agenda that endorses wickedness and encourages all that God is against.

Now I'm not saying that all movies are evil but the Agenda that a lot of modern films wants to push is not right for a Christian to partake in. In 2022, the average movie contained around 27 uses of profanity, and 48 references to immoral activity.

As time progresses, evil abounds and it is important that we are aware of the dark agenda that Hollywood is promoting.

Ephesians 5:11

And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them.”

2. The Attack

We as Christians are living in a battle for our faith. Our enemy the devil, has many tactics to try to destroy us.

A very successful attack that has taken down many Christians is entertainment. Satan will use whatever he can to try to ruin us.

1 Peter 5:8

Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour:

Our ultimate goal in the Christian life is to bring glory to God. So therefore we need to separate from anything that would hinder us from that goal.

If a farmer wants to raise a good crop, he separates it from insects and weeds.

If an athlete wants to win a championship, he must separate from junk food and other things.

If we want to achieve our heavenly goal, there will be some things we need to separate from.

1 Corinthians 10:31 *Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God."*

That is where standards come in.

Standard: *A prescribed set of rules and conditions to achieve goals and performance.*

We have standards because we want to separate from the evil attacks of the world and Satan.

I don't drink beer, smoke, gamble, cuss, steal, take drugs, smoke, or dance because I want to glorify God with my body, with my spirit, and with my lifestyle.

So to end, remember the attack that satan is fighting against.

His attack is successful not in a complete takeover but a small foot in the door.

That is why **Ephesians 4:27** warns us against giving a **PLACE** to the devil.

Ephesians 6:11-12

Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of his might."

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places.

Chapter 2:

Questions, Quality, and Quantity!

Below are some great questions to ask yourself when developing your music standards.

1. I don't want to disobey any Bible command.

This question is as easy as it gets. We should know that if the bible says not to do something, we better not do it. If there is a Bible verse that commands us not to see or partake in something, then we should not do it. As a Christian, our desire should be to please God by following his word.

If God's word says something is wrong, the excuse of " Well in my opinion" or " It doesn't affect me" go out the window. God's will and desires ought to be more important to us than pleasing our flesh.

Proverbs 3:5–6

“Trust in the LORD with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding.

In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths.”

2. I don't want to do anything that will develop an appetite that has no proper fulfillment.

This decision is basic. Much of what we do is fed and developed.

Our decisions in life help develop our appetite.

Never let evil have just a little bit because that little bit could give you an appetite for more and more. Take addictions, they start out just a little bit at a time and eventually develop an appetite within the person that has no true fulfillment.

3. I don't want to have the appearance of evil.

1 Thessalonians 5:22 *Abstain from all appearance of evil.*

Not only should we not do evil but we should avoid even the appearance of evil. As Christians, our testimony matters! We ought to keep a good name in everything we do. Even in our entertainment. Our testimony isn't just determined by what we do but also by what others think we do.

Proverbs 22:1 *A good name is rather to be chosen than great riches, and loving favour rather than silver and gold.*

Never fail to see the importance of this. *But why is this important?*

A. Because the Bible says so.

B. It could hurt my testimony.

We should avoid things that hurt my testimony. For example, I wouldn't visit a bar to witness. First, you could lose your reputation as a Christian if others saw your car parked outside and you walking into the bar.. Second, your witnessing in a bar could put you in a place of temptation.

C. Because I don't want to encourage others to sin.

That's why I would avoid cuss-boxes and the apps that delete the bad scenes. Because we represent Christ here on earth.. Imagine if you told someone about a movie you watched and then when they watch it, absolute wickedness and immorality come on and now they question your testimony as a Christian.

Quality and Quantity Principle.

If what we watch becomes sinful, it comes through Quantity or Quality.

A. Quality

Make sure what you watch is the quality of righteousness that Jesus would want.

Philippians 4:8 *Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things.*

B. Quantity

Many overlook this but a movie can be wrong if watched too much. It can be wrong if that is given more emphasis than God. It can be wrong if the abundance of screens causes you to neglect the things of God.

There is nothing necessarily wrong with binge watching a show as long as you are willing to binge-pray or binge-read the Bible. Don't make binge-watching a norm and spending chunks of time reading the Bible and prayer a rarity in your life. Don't let the flesh distract you from our ultimate goal. Living a life that is pleasing to God!

Chapter 3:

What not to watch in movies.

1. Immorality

About the easiest one to prove. We ought not watch things with vile, immoral, topics or scenes.

Psalm 101:3 *“I will set no wicked thing before mine eyes: I hate the work of them that turn aside; it shall not cleave to me.*

Never be prey to the snare of watching the filth of immoral movies.

Immorality in movies would include sexual innuendos, love-making scenes, immodesty, and impurity.

2. Profanity

It is quite a tricky topic to discuss but I still believe we should protect our ears from vile words.

Profanity is an ultimate denial of Jesus. Consider when Peter tried his hardest to show he wasn't a Christian and the one thing that worked was profanity.

Matthew 26:71 *Then began he to curse and to swear, saying, I know not the man. And immediately the cock crew.*

His profanity was a denial of Jesus. God takes profanity very seriously.

Years ago, when Morality was much higher, profanity was bad. Only the dirtiest most corrupt men would use profanity. Back then it was shameful and despised in society. In fact the first time the f-word was used in 1978. The movie was rejected and failed because of the atrocity of the word.

Now today, where morality has ceased, profanity is more culturally accepted. But does that make it ok? For one hearing profanity increases your chance of cussing.

A test was done in 2017 that in homes with no foul language, only 14 percent of those kids grew up to be swearers. And in homes where foul language was used sparingly, 81 percent of kids grew up to be swearers. Lastly, in homes with an abundance of profanity, 93 percent of kids grew up to be swearers.

The startling fact is that the gap between infrequent profanity and excessive profanity was very small. Hearing foul language influences you way more than you think.

We should avoid movies with profanity and guard our ears from them.

Philippians 4:8

Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things.

3. Witchcraft/ Sorcery

Ephesians 6:12 *For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places.*

As Christians, we are battle with the darkness of the world and the devil. It is our enemy.

Sorcery, witchcraft, and dark demonic themes should never be given entrance in what we watch. These dark things are a result of the wickedness of Satan and the Bible gives a strict warning against it.

Ephesians 5:11 *And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them.*

Romans 13:12 *The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light.*

I could give you verse after verse of God commanding us not to be a part of the demonic things that Satan uses to bind people.

Now you may think that " I'm not a part of the demonic stuff, I only watch it" But the word fellowship means a friendly association in Ephesians 5:11.

A child of God has no business being entertained by the evil forces of Satan.

Ephesians 4:27 *Neither give place to the devil.*

Chapter 4:

Witchcraft in Movies

Does God care about this?

Yes! Just as God cares about our words, actions, and thoughts, He also cares about what we allow into our minds. The Bible warns us repeatedly about not being in fellowship with darkness and the works of the devil.

Ephesians 5:11 – *“And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them.”*

Even if we “just watch it for fun” or think we aren’t affected, entertaining demonic themes gives Satan a small foothold in our hearts. Here are some more verses on Christians and witchcraft.

Acts 19:19 *“Many of them also which used curious arts brought their books together; and burned them before all men: and they counted the price of them, and found it fifty thousand pieces of silver.”*

That verse shows how believers in Ephesus, after trusting Christ, completely cut ties with their past in sorcery and destroyed everything connected to it with no halfway association.

So how practically, and we apply that to the movies we watch?

1. The Principle of Influence

“I will set no wicked thing before mine eyes: I hate the work of them that turn aside; it shall not cleave to me.” **Psalm 101:3**

Every movie, song, or show influences us. What we allow before our eyes shapes our thoughts, attitudes, and eventually our actions.

When someone watches magic, sorcery, or spells again and again, those things stop looking dangerous and start looking interesting. That’s how influence works not by forcing, but by familiarizing.

Movies like Harry Potter make witchcraft seem powerful, clever, and even good. That’s the opposite of God’s Word, which calls it an abomination (**Deuteronomy 18:10–12**).

Influence can also work the other way. If we fill our minds with what’s pure, holy, and uplifting, that will influence us toward Godliness. A Christian who loves the Lord will want to guard their eyes and heart carefully. Because whether we realize it or not, **what entertains us eventually shapes us.**

2. Principle of Testimony

“Abstain from all appearance of evil.” —1 Thessalonians 5:22

“Ye are the light of the world... Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven.” —Matthew 5:14,16

As Christians, we carry the name of Christ wherever we go and that includes what we watch. Our testimony is our visible witness to the world that we belong to Jesus. People around us are watching how we live, what we love, and what we allow into our homes.

When we choose to watch movies that glorify witchcraft, darkness, or sin, it doesn't just affect us personally it affects how others see our walk with God. The lost world already expects Christians to be different, and when they see no difference in our entertainment, our testimony **loses its strength**.

Chapter 5:

The Movie Theatre

"Just when you think Hollywood has reached the very bottom of immorality's muck, the movie theatre comes up with evidence that they have still found a way to dig deeper into wickedness and vile sins. It is hard to go to a movie theatre to watch a Disney movie these days without wondering what in the world is happening to America. All the previews display the worst of sins for everyone to see. The carnal Christian that goes to the movies ruins his testimony and brings shame to the name of Jesus."

The quote above is from Evangelist Robert Sumner. He wrote this in a book entitled Separation from Worldliness.

It was written in 1955!

As you will know, morality in America has only gotten worse. Yet why did Christians in the 50s, 60s, and 70s take such a strong stand in movies of back then and yet here we are 71 years later and we pacify it as a personal preference.

In recent years, many Christians have let down on their stand against going to the movie theatre. I will be looking and examining Biblical principles of why a Christian should not go to the movie theatre.

1. Lack Of Content Control.

First is the absolute lack of content control. The difference between watching a movie at home vs. the theater is a matter of content control. I need not to explain much here because it is quite obvious that if you are in a theater you will be exposed to whatever flashes on the screen regardless of what you came there to see.

Ps. 101:3 says: *“I will set no wicked thing before mine eyes: I hate the work of them that turn aside; it shall not cleave to me.”*

It is hard to take heed to this verse when you see the immoral and vile previews. When you sit there and watch those previews you may not be listening and fully engaged in them, but you are **tolerating** it. And toleration of wrong is compromise. One might say that we plug our ears or look the other way. It is foolish, but even more foolish because you put yourself there in the first place.

Proverbs 22:3: *“A prudent man foreseeth the evil, and hideth himself: but the simple pass on, and are punished.”*

2. Music

One might say, well, we are only there to watch the good movies.

Well first off, you by-stepped what I said above. But secondly, consider the terrible music. The Bible talks clearly against the worlds music yet we somehow think it is acceptable to listen to it only because we are at a movie theatre.

Ephesians 5:19–20

“Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord;

Nothing is Godly about the worlds corrupt and sensual music.

1 Corinthians 15:33 *“Be not deceived: evil communications corrupt good manners.”*

Don't be deceived today by the vile lie that music is morally neutral. Music is very powerful and we must guard our heart and mind.

This is another big difference between the movie theatre and watching a movie at home. In a movie theatre, you can't skip or mute the music. At home you can mute the ungodly junk the world tries to promote.

3. Your Testimony.

Lastly is the idea that your testimony can come in question when you go to the movies. As a Christian, we have a testimony to keep as being separate from the world.

2 Corinthians 6:17

"Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you."

The Bible clearly says that we should not conform, be friends with, and fellowship with the world.

In your life, are you being an example for other Christians when you walk into a movie theatre? It could hurt your testimony.

We should always keep our testimony and not help the world. When you rent a ticket to a movie, you are financially supporting a business that shows other wicked films for others. Don't be a part of that.

When you financially support the movies, you are supporting something that is anti-God and perverse.

Timothy 4:12 – *"Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity."*

So maybe this will cause you to think more seriously. All I ask for is for Christians to take an honest look at what they believe.

When you think about this topic, don't ask "Well what is so wrong about..." Instead ask yourself, "Is this acceptable to God?"

Perhaps we can sum up this post with one verse.

Romans 12:2

"And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

Chapter 6:

The Christian and Video Games

When we consider video games, we must realize that there is something wrong to be found in some video games. There are certain video games that have things that the Christian should have no part in.

The principles we should hold to are rather similar to what I established for my movies in a past chapter.

1. I Don't Want To Disobey Any Bible Command

If there is any content in my video games that causes me to disobey any Bible command, then I should obviously not play that game.

2. Immorality

There are simply just some games that a Christian can't play because of the immoral content. When the ESRB label on the bottom tells you that there is some sort of sexual content in it, then a Christian should have nothing to do with it. This is one reason to knock a game like GTA (aka Grand Theft Auto). Now one might say, "Well, I can handle it just fine."

But that is **never** the principle we should follow. Consider what was Samson's biggest struggle? Women. What was David's biggest struggle? Women. What was Solomon's biggest struggle? Women.

So you're telling me that the **strongest** man in the Bible, the **wisest** man in the Bible, and the **man after God's own heart** fell to women, yet you will be just fine. Take heed of the Bible and stay away from immorality in your movies.

Psalm 101:3

"I will set no wicked thing before mine eyes."

3. Profanity

God still takes profanity seriously. We may sadly be exposed to profanity in public places, but that doesn't mean we have to let it be in our home. Profanity is poison to the mind.

Proverbs 4:24 *“Put away from thee a froward mouth, and perverse lips put far from thee.”*

4. Witchcraft / Zombies

I refuse to play video games that have witchcraft, zombies etc. I do not play the survival mode in Minecraft but instead I play creative mode where you can shut those things off.

Ephesians 5:11

“And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them.”

If we want to obey this verse, we must not fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness. That is why I don't play games with demons, witches, zombies, etc.

Now one might think say "Well, it does not bother me."

The problem with the statement above is when we adopt that mindset, we begin to let feelings guide our standards and convictions rather than Gods Word.. We should not let our principles be determined by what we feel. It should always come from God and his word.

Proverbs 3:5-6

"Trust in the LORD with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths."

5. I do not want to roleplay sin.

I should stay away from playing a video game that expressly allows me to roleplay sin. Consider these and ask yourself if it's roleplaying sin.

- A) Playing basketball in NBA 2K — No
- B) Completing obstacle courses in Fall Guys — No
- C) Robbing places with scantily clad women in Grand Theft Auto — Yes
- D) Racing with cartoon characters in Mario Kart — No
- E) Living an immoral and sensual lifestyle in Sims — Yes
- F.) Use spells to summon demons in Skyrim — Yes
- G. Playing as chefs to complete cooking challenges in Overcooked- No

6. I should keep my testimony

When choosing to play any video game, we must ask ourselves if, by playing this, our testimony is kept. This is where a game like Fortnite comes into question. While you may play offline with some friends, the majority would think you play online.

I personally believe that a Christian should not play Fortnite online. It is a game where people go around killing each other. There is a lot of chat options and exposure to immodest women that people play with in the game. I don't play it for those reasons.

Our testimony isn't determined by what we do but rather by what people think we do.

For example: My dad loves a certain island drink called Malta. But he does not buy it because it comes in a beer-like bottle. He desires to keep his testimony. He avoids the appearance of evil.

We must ask ourselves if playing a certain video game can hinder my testimony. Remember, we represent Christ with our testimony.

1 Thessalonians 5:22

"Abstain from all appearance of evil."

7. How much time am I gaming?

We have covered some basic principles of what not to play in our video games but lastly, how much time should be spent on it.

Now I am going to be completely honest right here. I love playing video games. They are super fun for me. But where I must be careful is how much time I spend on those.

Let's take a step back and give an honest look on video games. When you think about it, they are unproductive through and through.

Video games are time-wasters at the core.

When someone asks you, what do you do in your spare time?

One could say, I'm a gamer. Or if we wanted to rephrase that, we could say, I'm a time-waster.

Now I am not saying we should not play video games at all. But I do think we should always be careful of how much time we spend on them. We should always strive to be productive individuals and part of that means having video games in priority. At the end of the day, we must realize they are insignificant. So upon this realization, we should set limits to be careful we do not overemphasize them.

I love video games, but even myself can fall into the trap of playing video games too much.

Ephesians 5:15-16

"See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, Redeeming the time, because the days are evil."

Chapter 7:

Artificial Intelligence

“AI is the new electricity”—Andrew Ng, one of the world’s leading AI experts.

Andrew said this because he believes AI will eventually power almost everything the way electricity does today.

AI has swept over our nation. And the scary part is that it is getting more powerful every day. It is also affecting jobs, technology and even education. It truly has permeated our society. Yet is AI bad? Is this new technology wrong for a Christian to use? I hope in this chapter to provide some Biblically-based principles concerning artificial intelligence.

1. We Should Always Be Honest When Using AI.

If we ever use AI in writing or creating something, a Christian should strive to be honest and cite that they used AI.

Proverbs 12:22

"Lying lips are abomination to the Lord: but they that deal truly are his delight."

It would be wrong to lie and say that we wrote or created something that in fact the AI created.

For example, sometimes I include AI in my writing. But I'm always careful to give credit for whatever AI wrote. It's simply being honest and dealing truly like the verse above says. You can find an example of giving credit below when I cited AI for a football post I did.

Ask yourself this. Am I completely honest when I use AI in my work?

2. Too Much Of Anything Is Bad.

Proverbs 25:16 *“Hast thou found honey? eat so much as is sufficient for thee, lest thou be filled therewith, and vomit it.”*

Artificial Intelligence is not inherently bad. It's all in how you use it. This idea applies to phones, computers, the internet, and just about any technology. However, people can spend too much time on AI to where it consumes their emotions, desires, and thought-life. I have heard of people even committing suicide because of the influence of AI.

Now some people condemn AI because AI causes people to commit suicide. I personally don't think this is logical. Consider the fact that the individual still had to make the decision of ending their life. Also AI won't randomly start telling you to commit suicide. The person began spending too much of their time and emotions into a piece of technology. And this technology will transform into whatever you want it to be. If you are constantly feeding it suicidal thoughts, you will get suicidal responses. one of the Chat-GPT ads even says, *get responses tailored to you*. That's why it's important to guard how much time you spend in AI.

Proverbs 4:23 *“Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life.”*

As a Christian, we must be careful in what we spend our time on. The Bible instructs us to redeem the time. There are negative affects to spending too much time on AI.

This was taken from an article I read on the dangers of AI.

Some researchers warn about “AI brain fry”—mental fatigue that happens when people rely on many AI tools at once. Workers reported headaches, mental fog, and slower decision-making. Experts say relying heavily on AI can erode confidence and job skills, because people stop practicing writing, analysis, and problem-solving themselves. Mental-health experts have also warned that excessive interaction with chatbots may worsen psychological issues for vulnerable individuals.

3. (For Teens) AI Should Be Monitored By Your Parents.

Proverbs 11:14 *“Where no counsel is, the people fall: but in the multitude of counsellors there is safety.”*

This next point is more directed towards teenagers. AI is very powerful and influencing. It would be very wise to have your parents monitor when you use AI. This creates accountability and prevents most negative effects caused by misusing AI.

4. (For Teens) AI Should Not Replace Schoolwork.

Proverbs 4:7 *“Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom: and with all thy getting get understanding.”*

Don't fall into the lazy trap of letting AI do your school. We should have the character to actually do our schoolwork. It is lazy and deceitful to use AI to complete schoolwork.

5. AI Should Never Replace God As Our Source Of Truth

Psalm 119:105: *“Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path.”*

One concern with AI is that people may begin to treat it like an authority on truth. AI can give information quickly, but it is not perfect and it does not have wisdom like God’s Word.

A Christian must always remember that the Bible is the final authority, not technology. When you have doctrinal questions, studying the Bible should be our go-to, not artificial technology.

The Bible constantly reminds believers to seek the Lord for guidance and wisdom rather than relying entirely on human systems or knowledge.

Proverbs 3:5–6 – *“Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths.”*

AI can provide information, but it cannot give the spiritual wisdom that comes from God’s Word. A Christian should never allow technology to replace studying the Bible, praying, and seeking the Lord’s direction.

6. Don't Let AI Rob You Of Creative Thinking, Problem Solving, Or Studying.

2 Timothy 2:15 *“Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.”*

AI certainly has a place in our modern world. However, we must ask ourselves whether it is slowly robbing us of important cognitive abilities. My biggest worry of AI is that it will make us mentally lazy to the point that we can't think for ourselves. Be careful of letting AI rob your imagination and creativity.

Beyond the scope of AI, technology can rob you of many wonderful things.

Every now and then, turn off the screen and read a book or play a board-game. Play a game of chess. Author a story. Go play your favorite sport. Have a literal conversation with a friend. Go outside and enjoy God's creation.

When you get back to these things, expect a **happier and more fulfilling life**. Beware of letting AI and other technology take on so many responsibilities. Because when they do, we lose that fulfilling and rewarding aspect of our life that comes when we think, learn, create, and imagine for ourselves.

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As AI continues to grow and become more powerful, Christians should not panic—but we should be wise.

The Bible may not mention artificial intelligence directly, but it gives us timeless principles for how we should live. If we use AI honestly, wisely, and with moderation, it can be a useful tool rather than a harmful influence.
