## 12: The form of a morpheme doesn't have to consist of phones

Lango (a Nilo-Saharan language of Uganda). These examples are all different inflected forms of the verb 'to stop'. ey all agree with a first person singular subject ('I'), but differ in their aspect.<sup>5</sup> e only difference between the first two forms is in the tone associated with the final syllable.

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àgíkò 'I stop (something), perfective'
àgíkô 'I stop (something), habitual'
àgíkkò 'I stop (something), progressive'
