## AP LANGUAGE & COMPOSITION SUMMER READING

**Assigned text-** Actively read or listen to <u>Educated</u> by Tara Westover (if you do the audiobook, please have a paper copy of the book).

Our in-class summer reading assessment for Educated will include passage-based MC questions
and a CTA from parts of Educated. This assessment will happen after the third class meeting day
in the fall.

**Choice text-** In addition to reading *Educated*, please choose and actively read at least <u>one additional</u> **NON-FICTION book;** this book can be chosen from the DS English summer recommended nonfiction lists *or* a **non-fiction** book in a personal area of interest.

• For your choice text, you will share your choice book with the class and write a book response that explores how the book prompted you to think more about your own life and/or the world around you.

## FOR EDUCATED:

- 1) Take notes on 3+ passages\* where the author is exploring the **process of her education** and/or the power dynamic in her family. For each of these passages,
  - a) analyze what is revealed about Westover's process of education and/or the power dynamic in her family *and*
  - b) take notes (handwritten post-its or handwritten notes) about the interesting language, style and rhetorical choices (such as diction, imagery, figurative language, structure, allusions, etc.).
  - \*\*\*These notes will be checked on the second day of AP English Language and Composition Class. **Important note: your notes should be in your own handwriting** *not typed.*
- 2) Identify **the overall thesis of** *Educated* [in our class, we will call this the overall rhetorical purpose]. In order to answer this question, *think* and take handwritten notes on: What more does the author want you to do, understand or discover about education and being educated? How do the power dynamics impact her education?

## FOR YOUR OTHER BOOK CHOICE:

3) Post-it at least 2 passages that made you think more about your own life and/or the world around you and/or caused you to ask questions and wonder more about the topic(s).

\*a passage is usually no less than 4-5 paragraphs, no more than 1-2 pages.
