A footnote by the composer, 'The Rose of Boralus': "James "Grilver" Cousland is an unconventional, boisterous fellow, and yet I have seldom seen a man with more passion for the hearts and minds of the people than he. A man of action and practicality, ready to do what he believes to be right no matter what. That makes a hero out of a man, recognition is so seldom given to him as he now lies ridiculed in a cell for trying to put an end to corruption the only way he knew how... I simply wonder if such passion would be better placed when tempered with keen-minded strategy. He is a man deserving of his freedom, for if we shackle those who fight against evil, we are no better than the evil we claim to face."
