Civil War Activity Guide

The tensions between the North and South were rising, ultimately due to the single issue of slavery. The North wanted to abolish slavery, and the South wanted to continue on with it. It seemed like a war was inevitable, and it turns out that it was. But first the nation had to get through this election. You'll learn how the bloodshed in Kansas, and the truly awful Kansas-Nebraska Act led directly to the decrease in popularity of Stephen Douglas, the splitting of the Democratic party, and the unlikely victory of a relatively inexperienced politician from Illinois, Abraham Lincoln. Lincoln's election would lead directly to the secession of several southern states, and thus to the Civil War.

Dred Scott Case	Fred Scott v. Sandford, 60 U.S. 393, was a landmark decision of the US Supreme Court.	Court held that the US Constitution was not meant to include American citizenship for black people.
Lincoln's Case	List of cases involving Abraham Lincoln concerns litigation while Abraham Lincoln worked as a lawyer. He brought cases to local courts, the Illinois Supreme Court and the United States Supreme Court during his career before he became President of the United States. Battle of Fort Sumter	The Battle of Fort Sumter was the bombardment of Fort Sumter near Charleston, South Carolina by the South Carolina militia.	The return gunfire and subsequent surrender by the United States Army, that started the American Civil War
