The points below might help you get started:

- Look at the museum websites to decide which museum sounds the most interesting
- Plan your visit make sure the museum is open on the day you want to visit and you know about any charges (most of the local museums are free)
- You don't have to see everything in the museum in one visit sometimes it is better to focus on one specific area
- Ask questions of the staff who work at the museum they will be able to tell you lots
 of extra information about the displays
- Visit the museum's cafe or shop if they have one museums rely on people spending money there to help them carry on
- Write a report about your visit to the museum

<u>The Old Operating Theatre</u> - MEDICINE THROUGH TIME - Housed in the attic of the early eighteenth-century church of the old St Thomas' Hospital, this atmospheric museum offers a unique insight into the history of medicine and surgery.

<u>Tudor World</u>, Stratford Upon Avon - ELIZABETH I - Using historical settings, discover the secret lives of the Tudors and what life was really like during the time of William Shakespeare; Francis Drake; Elizabeth I, Henry VIII and everyday people.
