I decided to use real flowers instead of fake ones to represent the care and attention I give to these relationships to keep them beautiful longterm. The background of my entire combine is the save the date for our wedding. I included this the background because it represents the idea of a strong commitment, like our vows on our wedding day. On the right-hand side of the combine is a royal flush. Every holiday, for as long as I can remember, my family has played cards games like poker, Kings in the Corner, and 99. The cards help to symbolize time spent together, the value of tradition, and those who have passed on. Even today, every time we play, we often reminisce about specific stories of my grandparents. Near the center of my combine is a 5 cent Euro. During college, I was lucky enough to spend some time backpacking in Europe. I met so many interesting people, tried new foods, saw incredible places on this trip which has inspired a life-long love of travel. The coin itself is reminiscent of this trip and also represents an open-mind and willingness to take on adventure, qualities I value. Next to the coin is sand.
