Check Your Writing Before You Post

- Contribute your best ideas to discussions; review other comments or content and **add** to the conversation.
- Make sure your statements are clear and coherent; read your words out loud before you submit them, use correct punctuation and capitalization to the best of your ability..

- Don't spam or abuse our class platforms.
- Respect other students' privacy: never pursue or share their information. Don't take screenshots or record any part of class. Practice Staying Engaged and Active Listening

- Practice being present and focusing on the conversation you're having.
- Active Listening includes: practicing silence to avoid interrupting; withholding judgment; asking clarifying questions.

Take an Inquiry Stance

- Be open to thinking new thoughts and taking a different point of view.
- Ask clarifying questions or rephrase what you've heard to confirm you understand what a person has said before you respond.

Speak Your Truth

- Make sure you're speaking for yourself. Consider using sentence starters like, "In my opinion..." "I notice..."
- Be honest and be your authentic self while being aware of the intent of your words and their potential impact.

Accept Discomfort and Non-Closure

- You're always safe in my class and during our conversations but being safe does not mean always being comfortable.
- If you feel uncomfortable in a conversation, reflect and ask yourself why you're feeling this way.
- It's okay to end a conversation in disagreement or without resolving an issue.
