How to Write a Directive

Formatting

- 1) Directive name (funny or serious)
- 2) Sponsors (Authors)
- 3) Signatories (don't have to endorse directive, simply wish to see it debated)
- 4) Clauses and sub-clauses

Private directive - A directive sent to the backroom by a delegate. They tend to be addressed like letters to a npc.

Ex.

My loving wife,

I need you to get my affairs in order for me. I'd like to find out how much money we have and invest it into a new brewery I am planning to build. Ask around our friends and see if we know anyone with experience in brewing!

Public directive - A directive that has a plan of action, sponsors, and signatories. It will be voted on publicly if it makes it to voting.

Directive: Rule of Law Sponsor: Maximin Isnard

Signatories: Charles-Louis Antiboul, Léger-Félicité Sonthonax, Jean-Baptiste Drouet, Jean-Paul Marat, and Stanislas-Marie Maillard

- 1. Establishes an oversight committee with the purpose of dictating military movements
 - a. This committee will have the purpose of ensuring orderly operations on domestic operations, including the discipline of subordinate soldiers, ensuring security, and handling protests
 - b. This body will consist of 12 members of the National Convention, with the members being established via a system based on the political makeup of the body at large
- 2. Establish a clear no quartering mandate within domestic grounds by our soldiers
- 3. Establish a central budget for the military, in addition to the state at large

Joint private directive (JPD) - A directive sent to the backroom that contains signatures from one or more delegates, in which they create a joint plan of action.

Ex. Signatories Andrew Jackson and Martin Van Buren

- 1. The frontiersmen of Andrew Jackson will receive funding for their military expeditions into the Florida territory from Van Buren and his associates in the New York political machine.
- 2. In exchange, Van Buren's merchants will be given priority access and control over conquered spanish ports on the peninsula, and can select an honorary governor of the area during its occupation

3.	Andrew Jackson will muster and pay a large and well armed force to march south, also calling
	on veterans and allies from the Battle of New Orleans.
