IX: ASSIGNMENTS

Research Participation (5% of final grade): This course includes a research experience requirement that is meant to expose you to a wide variety of psychology research either through participation, ethics training, and/or reading the literature. This requirement is worth 5% of your final class grade. You must complete a total of 5 hours (1 hour per 1% credit) to earn the full 5%. You may do so by completing any combination of the following:

- *Participate in a study:* Available research projects can be found on the research participation website:

<https://nova.sona-systems.com/Default.aspx?ReturnUrl=/>. All research projects available to you will post the expected participation time to the nearest half-hour. One hour of research participation equals 1 hour of research credit; you may earn up to 5 credits by participating in a research study. Study participation is due the last day of classes.

- *Carry out Online Human Subjects Training:* You may partially fulfill the research participation requirement by completing an online human subjects training activity. This entails passing all eleven module quizzes from Nova Southeastern University's College of Psychology, Department of Psychology and Neuroscience - Basic Course with a 90% or greater score. This option must be completed in full to get the maximum 2 credit hours (you will need to either participate in a study or write papers to make up the remaining 3 credit hours). This option must be completed three weeks before the last day of classes (see course schedule)
- *Write up a review of a research article:* You will choose an article from an approved journal and write-up a 1-2 page analysis of the paper. One article analysis equals 1 hour of research credit; you may earn up to 5 credits by writing up to 5 article analyses. In-class activities (20% of final grade): This course includes FOUR in-class written activities where you write brief comments/opinions on selected topics taught in class. This requirement is worth 20% of your final class grade. This option must be completed three weeks before the last day of classes (see course schedule).

Exams (75% of final grade): Four exams will be given in class. Exams will include multiple choice and short answer questions. Each exam will cover 4 chapters. **The exams cannot be made up unless arrangements are made PRIOR to the test date or missed due to documented emergency.**
