CRIMES / INCIDENTS

Crimes recorded between 01/11/2024 and 30/11/2024

North Queensferry – There were 8 Crimes recorded during this period relating to mostly road traffic offences with 6 of these crimes being reported on the nearby road network, or bridges.

Inverkeithing – There were 41 Crimes recorded during this period. Some crimes recorded relate to domestic abuse offences, assault, threatening and abusive behaviour and road traffic offences.

Dalgety Bay/Hillend – There were 23 Crimes recorded during this period. Some crimes recorded relate to Theft by Shoplifting, Racially Aggravated Behaviour, threatening and abusive behaviour.

Aberdour – There were 6 Crimes recorded during this period. Some crimes recorded relate to possession of an offensive weapon, Racially Aggravated Behaviour, resisting arrest

CALLS TO POLICE Dates: 01/11/2024 to 30/11/2024

53 calls relate to North Queensferry however 46 of these were to the roads network or the FRB.

155 calls relate to the Inverkeithing area.

17 calls relate to the Aberdour area.

87 calls relate to the Dalgety Bay/Hillend area.

COMMUNITY WARD UPDATE

During the month of November 2024 PCs Thomson and Kennedy have been patrolling the ward area and monitoring calls received to the area. They have had to assist response policing colleagues and attend to ongoing police incidents which require an emergency response.

Within the last month ward officers have carried out further patrols in the area including to the High Street in Inverkeithing and car parks in North Queensferry in relation to issues involving the use of offroad bikes and anti-social behaviour.

Community Engagement

PC's Thomson and Kennedy and PS Stewart have assisted social work and staff at Inverkeithing High School in delivering a successful 6-week trial for selected pupils at a local MMA gym. The pupils highlighted endured a 45-minute workout with a trained personal trainer followed by a 45-minute input from partner agencies. This included the charity Clued

up, Scottish Fire Service, Scottish Prison Service and social work. Ward officers also conducted an input around anti-social behaviour and the impact this has on the local community. The feedback from students was extremely positive with Inverkeithing High School noticing a change in behaviour for some of the pupils. Although this was only a 6-week course, the message about "making the right choice" was a theme throughout with positive relationships established between pupils and Police. It is hopeful a similar project will be conducted next year and is only part of a wider effort for officers to engage with young people in an effort to help them make better choices and reduce issues in the community.

Anti-social behaviour

Officers are aware of several calls in relation to Anti-social behaviour in the ward area. Several youths have been identified and charged accordingly. This continues to be an area of focus for CPT officers.

We would always encourage parents to engage with their children about what they do with their friends when they are out of the house and dissuade them from engaging in any anti-social behaviour.
