Resources are listed in order of approximate relevance.

To narrow results in databases:

Use topic AND "Title of Work or Author" to narrow results

Common Citations for Literary Criticism Papers:

Article from Online Database

Last Name, First Name. "Title of the Article." *Name of the Journal or Website,* volume and number, date of publication, pages from journal. *Name of Database,* URL or DOI address. Date of Access.

*Note: Cite online databases (e.g. LexisNexis, ProQuest, JSTOR, ScienceDirect) and other subscription services by providing the title of the database italicized before the DOI or URL. If a DOI is not provided, use the URL instead.

Section of Novels for Students- set of books located in the library

"Title of the Specific Novel." Name of the Series, edited by name(s), Vol. #, Publisher, Year, pages used.

Example Citation

"The Great Gatsby." Novels for Students, edited by Marie Rose Napierkowski, Vol. 4, Gale, 1998, pp. 114-136.

Book:

Last Name, First Name. Title of Book in Italics. City of Publication, Publisher, Publication Date.

Example Citation

Gleick, James. Chaos: Making a New Science. Penguin, 1987.

*Note: The City of Publication should only be used if the book was published before 1900, if the publisher has offices in more than one country, or if the publisher is unknown in North America.

Page/Article on a Website:

Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article or Page." *Title of Website in Italics,* the URL starting with the www. Date of Access. **Example Citation**
