#### Local Farms focused on Justice

The farms listed below are those we could identify that are both local, but also owned or led by BIPOC farmers, and/or operate with a lens of food justice. We have tried our best to identify BIPOC owned or led farms and marked them with a \* below. If you are aware of farms to add to this list, or a mistake we have made, please contact us.

\*<u>Alagnax Farm</u> - "BIPOC owned farm located in Occupied Duwamish Territory. Serving BIPOC community through food sovereignty efforts and workshops."

<u>Beacon Hill Food Forest</u> - "We work to dismantle an unjust food system rooted in white supremacy and conquest by nurturing its replacement, already alive and ready to grow. Through open harvest and collaboration within and among communities, we work to create a fair share for all."

\*Black Farmers Collective / Yes Farm - "a group of urban food system activists dedicated to providing opportunities to improve the health of our communities through all aspects of the food system. We are growers, sellers, preparers, educators and eaters. Our vision is based in the need for a place for African American leadership on the land, the Kwanzaa principle of cooperative economics, and the realization that mitigating the climate crisis requires action to support local production, carbon sequestration, and natural habitat creation."

\*Black Star Farmers - BIPOC led for the radical reclamation of land and food for BIPOC communities - MLK Farm and Cherry Street Farm. Organizes: <u>Ujamaa Food Circle</u> which curates monthly healthy organic food boxes that nourish and educate Black and Indigenous families in Seattle.

<u>Clean Greens Farm & Market</u> - a non-profit owned and operated by residents of Seattle's Central District, primarily fun by volunteers, with the mission to "solve the problem of limited access to healthy foods and produce in low income urban neighborhoods."

<u>The Color Farm</u> - Woodinville farm growing dye and fiber crops using regenerative methods.

<u>Farmer Frog</u> - "helps communities one garden at a time. Collaborating with all willing partners to grow food locally ensures that food desert and food justice issues will have lasting solutions."

- \*Indigenous Roots strive to provide equitable and sustainable access to original foods and medicine to promote self-determination.
- \*Kamayan Farm Located 25 miles east of Seattle, growing vegetables flowers, medicinal herbs and "seeking to help people build a reciprocal and reparatie connection to land."
- \*Nuturing Roots "community farming program focused on healthy food choices...focus on sharing the truth about systematic oppression with an emphasis on food and environmental justice."
- \*Percussion Farms "works to undo racism and other oppressions that prevent access to nutrition and healthy spaces for People of Color." <u>GoFundMe</u>

<u>Regeneration Farm</u> - Woodinville farm committed to regeneration of land, ecosystems, soil, local economics and food systems; driven by self-determination and environmental justice; valuing cultivation of humanity, building resilience, taking action, rooting in place, striving for balance, and acting with love.

<u>Rising Sign Farm</u> (Carnation, WA) - "dedicated to food sovereignty and justice, using growing techniques based in agroecology, distribution focused on access, and growth rooted in solidarity and care." They use a solidarity fundraising model and pay <u>Real Rent to the Duwamish</u>.

Root & Rabbit - Woodinville based farm using regenerative and sustainable small scale farming techniques.

- \*Sariwa Farm Sammaamish Valley farm specializing in pesticide-free Filipino vegetables.
- \*Sovereignty Farm "a new seed to table social enterprise that will provide opportunities for Indigenous elders, apprentices, artisans, and farmers; to grow and serve traditional foods at the Chief Seattle Club day center and the café that will be available to the public in Chief Seattle Club's ?ál?al "Home" building opening in Pioneer Square in 2021.
- \*Sweet Hollow Farm multiracial queer worker-owned cooperative farm in Woodinville. "Our purpose..is to use sustainable agriculture as a means to nourish and strengthen community self-determination and agency in the food system".

<u>Viva Farms</u> - empowering "aspiring and limited-resource farmers by providing bilingual training in holistice organic farming practices."

<u>21 Acres</u> - Local Woodinville farm, market, and education center focused on sustainable and regenerative agriculture

# Local Environmental Justice and Food Justice Community Organizations

<u>350 Eastside</u> - building a climate justice movement on the Eastside, focusing on policy, education, advocacy, and creative direct action.

<u>Community Alliance for Global Justice</u> "strengthens the global food sovereignty movement through community education and mobilization."

<u>FEEST</u> "sets the table for young people to transform the health and equity of their community by gathering around food & working towards systems change."

<u>Front and Centered</u> - "statewide coalition of organizations and groups rooted in communities of color and people with lower incomes; we're on the frontlines of economic and environmental change."

<u>Futurewise</u> "works throughout Washington state to encourage healthy, equitable and opportunity-rich communities, and to protect our most valuable farmlands, forests and water resources through wise land use policies and practices."

Got Green "organizes for environmental, racial, and economic justice as a South Seattle-based grassroots organization led by people of color and low income people."

Northwest Harvest - "Providing equitable access to nutritious food."

<u>NW Tribal Food Sovereignty Coalition</u> - "an opportunity for tribes and tribal organizations to convene efforts that are driven by cultural revitalization, empowering communities, and the use of innovative strategies to improve the health of the people".

<u>Pedaling Relief Project</u> - bike powered crisis response group working to strengthen existing mutual aid networks in local communities by transporting produce from p-patch gardens and urban farms to neighborhood food banks.

<u>Puget Sound Sage</u> - "combines research, innovative public policy and organizing to ensure all people have an affordable place to live, a good job, a clean environment, and access to public transportation."

<u>Solid Ground's Food System Support</u> - supports the Seattle Food Committee which provides support to the Seattle Food Committee.

<u>Sustainable Seattle:</u> "Our vision is a thriving, regenerative, sustainable Seattle which center reciprocity, liberation, and restored abundance."
