It examines perceptions about education, health, control over personal decisions, access to physical property and control over personal finances, marriage and family life, domestic violence, gender stereotypes in the media, work and employment, dress and appearance, barriers to safety at home and in public spaces, barriers to safety in the workplace, leadership and participation. The findings demonstrate that discriminatory social norms continue to stifle progress.</p>

Training Manual on Gender and Climate Change Resilience

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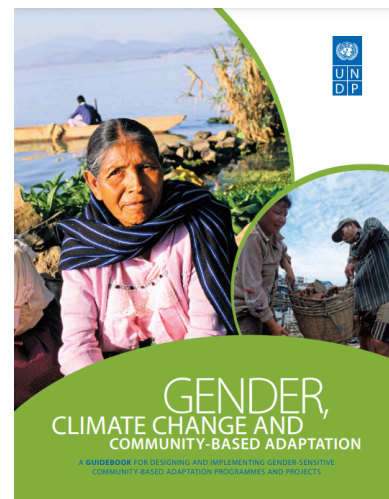
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A very comprehensive training manual for working with communities on gender, climate change resilience and disaster risk reduction. It aims to strengthen the capacities of civil society organisations to mainstream gender in their practices and to actively advocate for gender mainstreaming in policies, programmes, projects and legislation.

It was published in 2021 by The Asian-Pacific Resource and Research Centre for Women (ARROW) and UN Women Asia and Pacific Regional Office, and has those contexts in mind.








Gender, Climate Change and Community Based Adaptation





Advancing environmental sustainability will disrupt the world of work, since this is a structural transformation. Sustainability is not a job killer but a creator, and can be compatible with decent work. The paper calls for a development and economic model that supports environmental and social outcomes and ensures that the transition towards sustainability is just. It is full of data and research.</p>
