Course Description:

This course focuses on contemporary moments and forms of social transformation in Japan, Korea, Taiwan, China, including examples from Vietnam and the Philippines. Our approach will be interdisciplinary. We will bring cultural anthropology together with environmental studies, architecture, literature, film, social media and popular culture. We will read, think about and discuss some of the historical and economic contexts of recent social transformation. We will explore the meanings of transformation, change and the social, as well as look in depth at current social change projects.

The focus of the Fall 2022 course will be on gender, low birth, reproductive labor, new forms of work, the natural and built environments and the socio-cultural and political responses to over two decades of "neoliberal" reforms and following the 3.11 (triple disasters of Fukushima in Japan). We will also explore the significance of center-periphery divides and new connections among the young in East Asia.

This fall, along with other shorter readings, we will read and discuss a new edited volume based on papers from a cross-East Asia regional workshop of scholars and scholar activists at UW in 2021. The volume, *Spaces of Creative Resistance: Social Change Projects in East Asia,* has been produced by UW faculty, contributed to by these workshop members and by UW seminar students.

Along with a short midterm and final exam, students will carry out their own small group research projects based on our readings, discussions, and films.

Discussion Leader (DL), Readings Response Postings, (Participation and Attendence)

1: Discussion Leader (DL): Every student is asked to help lead discussion for one of our readings. Please look over the syllabus this first week and email me with your first and second choices by 10/3. DL's will have 5-10 minutes in which to provide a short discussion of the context and argument of the reading and to raise 2 questions (one specific and one integrated).

2: Reading Responses: <u>Beginning on 10/3</u>, <u>students are responsible for posting "reading responses"</u> (<u>short specific commentary</u>) on one day's readings for the week. (<u>There is only one meeting in Week 2-see weekly schedule-so everyone will post on Anagnost Reading for 10/3</u>)

On some days this may mean one longer reading, on others 2-3 shorter ones. These commentaries should include the context, short summary of argument, indicate ideas or terms that the student would like explained, make a connection with an earlier reading and (importantly) raise *specific* questions for discussion. Please pay close attention to the academic approach of the authors and note how this affects the method and writing. *In order to receive credit for these postings, students must be in class and prepared to participate in class discussion based on their postings.*

Midterm Exam:

There will be a short (90min) midterm exam in this class. It will focus on the key terms and ideas in our readings up to this point. *The exam will be open book, pdfs and open note.*

Final Exam:

The final exam will also be 90 minutes in length. It will focus on the final 3 weeks of conceptual readings.

Small Group Research Project

Students will choose a <u>specific topic area</u> of our class readings and discussion on which to focus for a small group research project. The project will proceed in 3 stages: Choice of topic, group members and narrowing of topic; meeting with instructor to discuss process, method and additional readings; presentation and feedback.
