How did *Queen's* performance at Wembley Stadium in '85 set the framework for modern globalism as Freddie Mercury's "note-heard-around-the-world" was broadcast live to 95% of all televisions on planet Earth? What do *Grandmaster Flash, Public Enemy, Black Flag, Minor Threat,* and the *Dead Kennedys* all have in common?

We will examine the social and political movements behind the lyrics, music, and performances of the 20th century's major contributors to the rise of "Rock & Roll", including Jazz, Blues, Hip Hop, Punk Rock, and Heavy Metal. Analysis of the development of technology that coincided with the global rise of these genres from vinyl, cassettes, broadcast, cable, CD's, DVD's, and the rise of the Internet are also part of the curriculum.
