- ✓ A rating that reflects your evaluation of how well the author accomplished his/her purpose.
- A few sentences synthesizing how the central idea of this text relates to that of another

KEY IDEAS AND DETAILS:

- ✓ The central idea of the text.
- ✓ Textual evidence that supports the central idea
- ✓ Inferences you can draw from the title, pictures, headings, and subheadings
- ✓ The methods the author uses to shape the central idea (examples, facts, debates, statistics, etc.)
- ✓ Important comparisons, analogies, or categories used to show similarities or differences between individuals, ideas, or events
- ✓ Important ideas presented in graphs, timelines, charts, and other graphics
- ✓ Text structures the author uses to accomplish the purpose and message
- ✓ Missing voices are there any groups who are marginalized, silenced, or not represented?
- ✓ Lessons or information you learned or found fascinating
