

## World History Semester 1

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2023-2024 School Year

**Textbook:** HMH Social Studies World History. If you want a textbook for your keeping you must check one out through Mary Franchak or the Media Center. The textbook is online available online through Class Link (launchpad).

**Course Description:** Students will trace the history of major civilizations of the world. A chronological focus includes the beginnings of ancient civilizations in the Middle and Far East through global interactions between nations in the twentieth century. Students also examine the changes and impacts on religion, government, culture as well as technology through trade and exchange of ideas between cultures. Connecting themes of conflict and change, conflict resolution, culture, governance, location, movement, migration, continuity and change over time, individuals, groups, institutions, and technological innovation will help create enduring understandings. World History is a required course for graduation.

(8-11) 2<sup>nd</sup> 9 weeks. *(Practice grades can be +/- 5 for the projected Semester total).*

- Tests will be administered at the end of each Unit as a summative assessment. All tests are announced.
- Quizzes are given intermittently over selected material as a minor assessment. All quizzes are announced.
- Assignments will include whole class assignments, group assignments and individual assignments specifically designed for the needs of the specific student. Students who need additional instruction, extra time or have shown that they are ready for enrichment activities will have that opportunity through time specifically built into each week. All graded work will be announced.

### Late Work Policy

Late work will be penalized 15% immediately upon being late, meaning past the original due date. Late work not submitted by the end of the Unit, will received an automatic deduction of 25% off. If it is not submitted within 10 days of the original due date, it will become a permanent grade of “0” and will no longer be allowed to be submitted.

If students are absent, they will receive the same number of days they were absent to complete the assignment without penalty. If students are turning in work late due to an absence, **they are required to fill out a FORMS on TEAMS.**

- Prohibited Use of Personal Communication Devices (PCD) During School Day Possession of Personal Communication Devices (PCD) (e.g., cell phones, tablets, recording devices) by a student at school during school hours is a privilege that will be forfeited if a student fails to abide by the Student Code of Conduct. \*\*\*Multiple and/or prior infractions could lead to increased consequences\*\*\*
- Students must have cellphone put away (backpack, purse, bag) and NOT visible.
- In grades 6 through 12, the use of PCDs is not allowed during instructional time and will only be allowed when explicitly instructed to do so by a teacher or other school staff member.
- Inappropriate Recording and Distribution Using Personal Communication Devices (PCD) The use of cell phones and other PCDs for noneducational purposes, including but not limited to, recording staff and/or students without permission or other inappropriate content is strictly prohibited. In addition, using a cell phone or other personal communication device to record a fight, battery or any other inappropriate content and either sharing with others (e.g., airdrop, nearby share, Share IT, etc.) and/or uploading the video to any other type of social media/web-based media is also strictly prohibited. Consequences for doing so may result in up to a 10 Day suspension and a referral for a discipline hearing with a recommendation for long term suspension.
- Students will be asked to give their teacher their phone and or placed in the cell phone holder if they do not follow policies and then will have it returned at the end of class.
- **\*\*\*Please Note: If a student violates this rule which leads to the student's personal communication device being confiscated by school personnel (administration), it will only be released to the parent or guardian who must come to the school to personally retrieve the device. \*\*\***

### Grade Reporting Timeline

- Progress reports are visible in the portal every 4.5 weeks.
- Report cards are visible in the portal every nine weeks.
- Credit for high school courses is earned at the end of each semester.
- Teachers will notify parent(s)/guardian(s) by personal contact or in writing if a student is in danger of receiving an F as a final grade or is experiencing a significant decline in achievement.
- Seniors: Six weeks prior to the end of each semester, each teacher will provide the principal a list of all seniors who are failing or in danger of failing

### R.I.S.E and Recovery per FCS

RECOVERY- All students will have 1 per major, which must be completed before next major.

- This will be completed for a Max Grade of 75%.
- Students are encouraged to complete missing work and or/reteaching prior to recovery attempt.
- **Deadline is before the next major** and during RISE schedule for Social Studies (see above). The only exception is for students who have excused absences during the five-day window.
