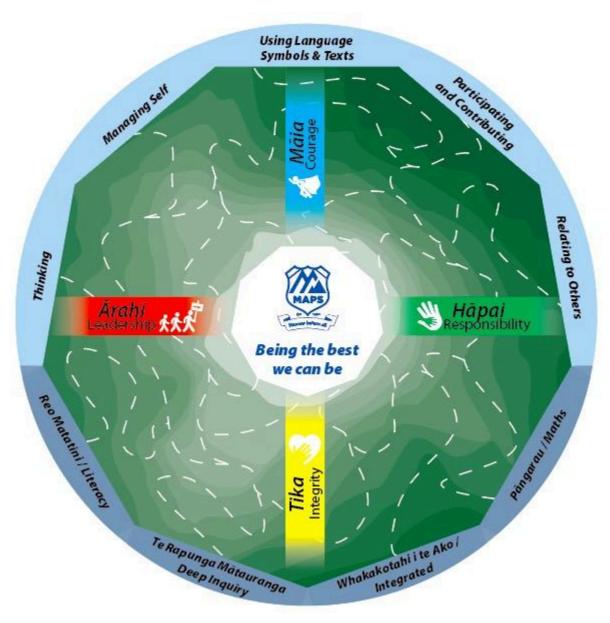


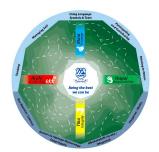
Our Local Curriculum

Being the best we can be | Ko te kaha e tarea ai, ko te mauri ora, kei runga noa atu

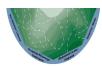
Our vision is always in sight no matter what we are learning. For this reason it forms the heart of our curriculum at the summit of the maunga.



Our Values

Our Values are always all around us. Wherever our learning pathways take us our Values are like the ground we walk upon. They are:

- HĀPAI | Responsibility We take care of ourselves and others, our belongings and our school.
- ĀRAHI | Leadership We lead the way and are role models for those around us.
- TIKA | Integrity We are honest and trustworthy in our actions and words.
- MAIA | Courage We take risks, persist and try new things even when it's tough.



The Learning Areas

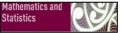
Like the competencies, the Learning Areas of the New Zealand Curriculum help us explore our local curriculum and provide contexts for our learning.

Pāngarau / Maths: comprising the Maths and Statistics curriculum



Te Rapunga Mātauranga / Deep Inquiry: comprising the Science, Technology,
 Social Sciences and Arts curriculums

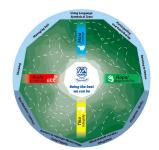

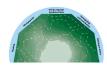








Our Local Curriculum



The Key Competencies

The Key Competencies are part of the New Zealand Curriculum. Having equal importance with values and learning areas, they describe the skills and abilities we develop as learners. Using the key competencies, combined with other aspects of our local curriculum, we can explore learning and discover new knowledge. They are

Thinking

- We focus on the learning intention
- We reflect on our own learning
- We look for quality in our own work
- We explore and clarify ideas through questioning

Managing Self

- We are organised and ready for learning
- We listen and follow instructions
- We manage our time effectively
- We are actively involved in the learning process
- We show and take initiative

Using Symbols, Language and Texts

 We interpret and use words, numbers, images, movement, metaphor, and technologies to communicate and understand ideas

Participating and Contributing

- We are active participants
- We interact effectively in a group

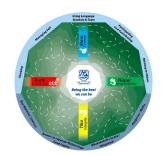
Relating to Others

- We contribute to discussions
- We listen actively
- We show respect for peers and property
- We show respect towards others' identity, language and culture



The Pathways

At MAPS we believe that learning does not usually happen in straight lines. The pathways on our maunga show how our learning is about exploring, using and developing different tools and skills and ranging over different terrain to deepen our knowledge.
