

Christian Engagement in Nation Building

Isaiah 66:8a

Who has ever heard of such things? Who has ever seen things like this? Can a country be born in a day or a nation be brought forth in a moment?

Introduction Isaiah 66:8a

As Christian professionals, we are called to be active participants in God's plan for our nation. Malaysia's future is not just in the hands of politicians or policymakers—it is in ours as well. Through our faith, influence, and daily actions, we can contribute to a nation that reflects God's righteousness, justice, and love.

1. The Amazing Design of God Acts 17:26

God's design is always good and purposeful. When we accept Christ, we step into a life of divine intention — one where we are privileged, purposeful, and powerful in His plan.

We are privileged to be chosen to represent Christ in our workplaces and communities. God's design is always purposeful. Our careers, relationships, and influence have eternal significance. The Holy Spirit empowers us to make a difference beyond human ability. Every decision we make; whether in business, education, or public service; should align with God's greater purpose for Malaysia.

2. The Wonderful Discovery of God's Purpose *Philippians 2:14-16*

As believers, we are called to "shine like stars" and "hold out the word of life." This means:

- Living with integrity in our professions.
- Being agents of transformation in our industries.
- Leading with Christ-like values in a world that often prioritizes profit over people.

When people come to faith in Christ they begin to discover God's purpose for their lives. When we embrace God's purpose, we become catalysts for change in our nation.

3. The Potential Destiny of Our Nation Isaiah 66:8a; Romans 1:16; Psalm 24:1

Malaysia's future depends on the hands of every person in our nation, especially Christians. It is every citizen's contribution – not just leaders, but everyday professionals like us.

It is possible because of the power of the Gospel and that "the Gospel really does change everything." (Tim Keller). Moreover, this world and this nation belongs to the Lord.

We must believe that Malaysia can experience revival, righteousness, and unity through Christ.

How Then, Should We Live?

A. Clarity of Who We Are Matthew 5:13-14, 13:33

We are to be:

- Salt of the earth and light of the world (Matthew 5:13-14) to preserve goodness and expose darkness.
- Yeast in dough (Matthew 13:33) small but transformative influence in society. We must be an influence in our workplaces and colleges. If we aim to reach out every quarter, we can really change the world for Christ.

Action Step: Instead of complaining about corruption or injustice, introduce Christ's light through ethical leadership and discipleship.

B. Commitment to the Nation *Luke 13:31-33*

- Live for a cause, not just comfort: Use our skills for nation-building. Jesus stayed in Jerusalem despite knowing that His life was in danger.
- Embrace challenges, not just convenience: Step out in faith to influence our fields. Life is exciting when you are challenged. Everything is predictable elsewhere. Slow down, pray and reach out
- Pursue mission over materialism: Invest in eternal impact, not just wealth. Always share Christ to everyone that you meet.

C. Courageously get involved and persevere for the long haul Acts 20:17-24; 1 Timothy 21:4

- By praying
- By caring reach out and care
- By collaborating work with those with the same concern for the best of Malaysia
- By sharing the Good News of Christ. Everybody is searching for something to fill them up. There's restedness and peace in Christ.

Conclusion

Let's rise to our calling to transform Malaysia - one life, one workplace and one prayer at a time.

Suggested Questions linked to the Sermon:


- What do you believe God is doing in Malaysia today? Where do you see opportunities for revival, transformation, or Gospel impact?
- How can you personally live as **salt** (preserving godliness), **light** (exposing truth), and **yeast** (influencing transformation) in your workplace / community? Which of these three (salt, light, yeast) is the hardest for you to live out, and why?
- Based on the table below, identify where you see yourself in the current season of your life. Are you closer to comfort or cause; convenience or challenge; or, materialism or mission? What do you need to give up or take up to move from one spectrum to another?

Which MODifier Are You?

MOD (short for "modification") generally refers to a user-created change to a game or software, often to enhance gameplay or add new features. However, the term can also be used to describe hacking itself, which is the act of unauthorized access or modification of a system. The distinction often lies in whether the modification is sanctioned by the game developer or is an unauthorized exploit.

I have been an e-hailing driver since the pandemic, among my other jobs. Since I like to drive and meet people, it is indeed humbling and a privilege to serve the community and get paid for it. I thank God for giving me a way out during the pandemic and since then, He has never failed to provide me when my finances were short. I think I have learnt to be more dependent on Him and it has certainly shifted my focus.

Recently while I was waiting for a customer nearby KLIA Downtown, I overheard a few drivers talking. Apparently, there is a MODifier app that allows hackers to override

a common e-hailing app. They take all the high paying jobs (airport and outstation) and distribute these jobs to certain drivers who subscribe to the MOD. For a mere RM 100 to 200 a month, drivers get up to RM 600 or even RM 1000 per day. The ROI (Return of Investment) looked amazing. It almost made me want to approach them and ask them for more information. RM 600 per day would solve many of my financial problems. It was tempting.

Then, I decided not to ask them. It dawned on me that my dependence on God would reduce and my dependence on these MOD operators would increase. These MODs are already causing a loss of income to drivers on their already low fares and income. It certainly is not fair. This is how many people who don't think they need God are operating. They depend on lobbyists and the certain few who control the system. For a fee, they hack the standard way and think they are taking the "Expressway" towards wealth and dominance. Becoming famous can cause many Good people to lose their income and opportunities to move forward in society.

Did you know that if you become a Christian, GOD also encourages you to be a MODifier in your society? These MODifiers are **salt** (preserving godliness), **light** (exposing truth), and **yeast** (influencing transformation). The Holy Spirit has already instilled these MOD's for you to be a better Christian. He doesn't force them upon you. You don't need to pay a fee for 'extra' activation. Instead of degrading the society and making it worse, you make the community better and transform the nation.

Be a positive MODifier for Christ.
