Landmarks Lesson Plan

Objective:

Students will identify and explain the significance of various community, state, and national landmarks, such as monuments and government buildings.

Materials Needed:

- Pictures of different landmarks
- Paper
- Markers
- Computer or tablet for research

Lesson Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes):

 Begin the lesson by discussing landmarks and their importance. Provide examples such as the Statue of Liberty, the White House, or the Eiffel Tower.

2. Discussion (10 minutes):

• Show pictures of different landmarks and ask students if they recognize any. Discuss why these landmarks are important and what they represent.

3. Activity - Landmark Research (15 minutes):

- Divide the students into small groups.

5. Wrap-Up (5 minutes):

 Lead a discussion on the similarities and differences between the various landmarks studied. Ask students to reflect on why landmarks are important in our communities, states, and countries.

Extension Activity:

Have students create an imaginary landmark and present it to the class, explaining why it is significant.
