The word "Abstract" should be Calibri Light, Bold, and 12 pt and the abstract itself is also Calibri Light, spaces 1 and 10 pt. The abstract should at least include the research objectives, the design/methodology/approach, and the main results or findings. This should be a summary of the paper and not an introduction. Since abstracts can be used in abstracts and database indexing, they must be self-contained (i.e., no numerical references) and substantive. If applicable, the abstract may also contain other results or findings, implications, and novelty of the research.</p> <p>Keywords : Maximum of 5 keywords.</p>
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Introduction (section)

This section contains the research problem and background, research gaps, objectives, research organization, contributions (research benefits from theoretical and practical), research results, and implications (practical advice based on research results). The results of the research and its implications in the introduction are only suggestions (not mandatory).

The numbering of sections and sub-sections follows this template. All margins should be 3 cm in A4 size for paper size with all 1.15 spacing and always add spaces after paragraphs. The size and style of the page setup are shown below. Examples of tables and figures are also shown below.

If you want to display the chart, then all the information like Tittle chart, Axis Title, Legend, Data label, Data table, Plot area, etc. It must be clear and understandable. Each table, figure, and graph should be explained and numbered accordingly by the template.

Literature Review

Background Theory

This section consists of theories that support research based on original papers or authoritative international textbooks.

Previous Studies

This sub-chapter describes relevant, comprehensive, and updated past studies, related to the topic, as well as summarizes past studies of what appears to be consensus, resolved, and what remains the puzzle that underpins the research.

Conceptual Framework (optional)

This section consists of illustrations and descriptions of conceptual frameworks to answer research questions.

Methodology

The methodology consists of data, model development, and the methods used. This paper can be quantitative or qualitative. However, if the paper is quantitative, equations may appear in line with the text, if it is simple, short, and not very important; For example, $a = b / c$. Important similarities appear in their lines. The principal equation is numbered, with the number of the equation placed in parentheses and correctly justified. Writers are strongly encouraged to use the MS Word Equation Editor or Math Type to create equations in text and display. Equations are considered part of the sentence and should be punctuated accordingly.

To set a style, type Equation in the style box. But this style only sets the tab's stop position. To put the equation in the right place, just press the tab button once. And to type in the number of the equation, press the tab key once again from the right side of the equation.

Data

This section consists of an explanation of the data used in this study and why regarding the requirements of the method used.

Model Development

This section consists of an explanation of the proposed models, their main references, their modifications, etc. Hypotheses, if any, will be described in this section.

Method

This section consists of an explanation of the methods used, and why they are used. Why not another method. Refer to the original reference of the inventor of the method first, then refer to others, such as international journals and/or textbooks.

Results and Analysis

Results

This section consists of a presentation of all the results in tables, graphs, etc., and a description of those numbers and figures.

Endurance test

This section consists of one or more tests to check the durability of the results and to ensure that the results are strong and meaningful.

Analysis

This section consists of a critical discussion of the findings, an explanation of the novelty of the research results, the justification of the results, and a discussion of how the results differ from or are the same as other related studies.

Conclusions and Recommendations

Conclusion

This section consists of an explanation of the findings of the research question. And, if anything, explanations from other findings.

Recommendations

This section consists of recommendations for practitioners, regulators, and academics, based on the findings of this study.

When using the 6th edition APA format, follow the date method of the author of the quote in the text. Short alphabetically. **The reference style used by the American Psychological Association (APA) uses Mendeley or other standard reference software.**

If you are referring to an idea from another work but NOT directly citing the material, or making references to an entire book, article, or other work, you should only refer to the author and year of publication and not the page number in the references in your text. All sources cited in the text should appear in the reference list at the end of the paper.

1. Short quotes. If you're quoting directly from a work, you should include the author, year of publication, and page number for reference (preceded by "p."). Introduce the citation with a signal phrase that includes the author's last name followed by the date of publication in parentheses. According to Jones (1998, p.199), "Students often have difficulty using APA styles, especially when it is their first time".
2. Long quotes. Place direct quotes of 40 words, or longer, in freely-typed line blocks, and omit quotation marks. Start the quote on a new line, overhanging 1/2 inch from the left margin, that is, in the same place you would start a new paragraph. Type the entire quotation in the new margin, and indent the first line of the next paragraph in the quotation 1/2 inch from the new margin. Maintain double spacing throughout. Parentheses should appear after the closing punctuation.
3. Summary or paraphrase. If you're paraphrasing ideas from other works, you only need to refer to the author and the year
4. publication in references in your text, but APA guidelines encourage you to also provide page numbers (although not required. According to Jones (1998), the APA style is a difficult citation format for first-time learners. APA style is a difficult citation format for first-time learners (Jones, 1998, p. 199).
5. References. The References section lists the books, articles, and reports cited in the paper.
