5.	<p>The below was emailed as a request to allow members of Stanford's Alternative Spring Breaks to stay at Cloyne during part of Spring Break. Kate Hassey is part of the Stanford Co-ops.</p> <p>Program description: Alternative Spring Breaks Natasha and I [Kate Hassey] are leading a one-unit class and accompanying week-long spring break experience focused on Housing Justice in the Bay Area. This program presents an opportunity for students to engage with the skyrocketing costs of housing—and accompanying displacement and homelessness—occurring in our own backyard. The course centers on the history of housing policy, current issues and debates in housing policy, and the role of various actors and organizations in either maintaining or challenging the status quo. During our one-week immersive experience, students will participate in community-engaged learning with organizations fighting for housing equity, and will engage with local changemakers, from city officials to local organizers, in East Palo Alto, Oakland, and San Francisco.</p> <p>Host: We do not know anyone in the house, but would be grateful if someone volunteered to host us!</p> <p>Number of people: 11. If accepted, we would be more than happy to send along names and pictures.</p>

	<p>Substance Free Policy: We are now aware, and will pass this information along to our participants and ensure compliance if we are accepted.</p> <p>Dates: 3/23, 3/24, and 3/25.</p> <p>Daily Schedule: We would likely use the kitchen (if available) for breakfast ~8am, and also pack lunches during that time. We would be back to use the kitchen (again, if available) and do debriefing activities around 6pm. We would be happy to pay \$7/person/day to compensate the house.</p> <p>Orientation: Natasha or I would be happy to schedule a trek over to Berkeley at some point before our stay for a house orientation, if that would make things easier on your end.</p> <p>Thank you for considering our request, and we'll keep our eyes on our emails for an update!</p>
