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INTRODUCTION (Palatino Linotype 12, Bold, Uppercase, Align Justify)

The introduction section contains the research background, the urgency of the identified problems, and the relevance of previous studies that serve as the foundation

for the research. At a minimum, the author should address two key questions: (1) why the researcher believes that this research problem is important to investigate, and (2) why previous researchers have not adequately addressed the topic under study and how the present research contributes to resolving the issue.

Authors must use recent references from reputable journal articles as the basis for the research. The length of the introduction section should be approximately 15–20% of the total manuscript. Beginning with the second paragraph, each paragraph should be indented by one TAB space on the keyboard. The article should be typed in Palatino Linotype 12, single spacing (1.15), and justified alignment.

METHODS (Palatino Linotype 12, Bold, Uppercase, Align Justify)

The methods section describes the research approach and methodology, data sources or population and sample, the sampling technique or determination of data sources, research instruments and data collection methods, as well as data analysis techniques. This section should present a clear description of the research procedures and steps that are distinctive and relevant to the topic under study. The length of the methods section should be approximately 10–15% of the total manuscript length. The text should be written in Palatino Linotype 12, single spacing (1.15), and justified alignment.

FINDINGS AND DISCUSSION (Palatino Linotype 12, Bold, Uppercase, Align Justify)

This section presents the research findings clearly and in detail. The results may include patterns, characteristics, statistical analyses, hypothesis testing, and other forms of findings in accordance with the nature of the research. Tables, diagrams, figures, or relevant quotations should be included when necessary to ensure that the visualization of the research findings is easily understood by readers. The text should be written using Palatino Linotype 12, line spacing (1.15), and justified alignment.

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Tables should be written sequentially as Table 1, Table 2, Table 3, Table 4, and so on (if applicable). Below the table, the explanation should refer to it using phrases such as “Referring to Table 1...”. The table should be placed below or immediately after the paragraph that refers to it, as illustrated in the example below.

Figures and Illustrations

Presenting figures and illustrations effectively in a scientific paper is crucial for conveying information clearly and enhancing the reader's understanding. Each figure or illustration must have a caption that included the figure number and a brief description, preferably one or two sentences. The caption should follow the format "Figure 1. Figure caption". All figures must be mentioned in the text consecutively and numbered with Arabic numerals. The caption should be understandable without reference to the text. Whenever possible, place the key to symbols in the artwork, not in the caption. To insert the figure into the template, be sure it is already sized appropriately and paste before the figure caption. Figures should be designed to fit well within the page layout of the paper without appearing cramped or overly large. They should complement the text rather than dominate it.



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In this section, the researcher also conducts a DATA ANALYSIS based on the RESEARCH FINDINGS presented above in a clear and detailed manner, grounded in relevant theories, the methods employed, and referring explicitly to the RESEARCH QUESTIONS formulated earlier in a rigorous and systematic way. The presentation of the research results and discussion should constitute approximately 50–60% of the total length of the article. The discussion section should be written in Palatino Linotype 12 pt font, 1.15-line spacing, and justified alignment.

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This section presents the research findings and the essence of the discussion. The author should concisely state the substantial findings of the research conducted. The conclusions must be supported by data and should not be speculative. The conclusions must also be consistent with the objectives or research problems addressed in the study.

Authors should provide recommendations for the implementation of the research findings and suggestions for further studies that may be necessary. The conclusion should be presented in paragraph form. The length of the conclusion should be approximately 5–10% of the total length of the manuscript.
