So I already was like, the way you said it, maybe you're just in the zone, but you're like, So he builds this boat and he wanted to take it to New Orleans.

I thought that would be a good idea. Lake sounded brilliant to me at the time. We'd we'd done a couple of river trips, those guys and I in the past, nothing that involved. But yeah, it was appealing at the time. Yeah. The trip began with. We had to figure out how to get this boat on Evansville Sing. It's a heavy boat.

I don't know how much it weighed. Is heavy. Greg built this medieval looking car out of wood. He built the wheels out of wood. And with this cradle that he put under the boat and winched it up onto Mark Hagerty's car trailer. And then we strapped it all down. Everything seemed good and got it out on Highway 37, going south, started getting up to speed, got about 40 miles an hour,

and a part of the cradle broke and the boat shifted backwards, which meant it pulled the tongue of the trailer up, which meant it lifted the back of the truck up.

Yeah. And so I remember as I was talking on the phone to my wife now, but girlfriend then Emily, you know, just is very poor. And I was like, Yeah, here we go. We go. And I look at the, the rear window and everything is just like flapping around like, like a big snake behind the truck. This is on 37.

Yeah. Right, right out just off of Vernal Pike. There used to be an exit. I'm just picturing the people, you know, watching this as a driver. Next to you or something or behind you. Right. But again, this is beginning of February, So it's it's cold there, you know, or we start going down the Ohio River and, you know, it's snow and some and we took we were we were pretty avid dumpster divers at that point.

So we, you know, gathered a bunch of food and before we left and we had a couple of tall five gallon buckets. And it just so happened that it was perfect diameter to fit pies in, like and there were always pies in the dumpster, you know? Right, Right. We were burning a lot of calories. It was cold as pie buckets didn't last very long. It was freezing your ass off, destroying pies, pretty much. Yeah. We get in a little ways. We're down south of Illinois. There's a big section of shiny national forests along the river there. It's really beautiful. There's not much around there, but we had a day where it was really choppy water, some wind.

00;03;52;11 - 00;04;13;19

It was kind of uncomfortable. So we pulled off in this one town that was there, this little town called Golconda, and just spent the day waiting for the wind to die down. And it did in the evening. And so we had we had running lights. We thought, well, we'll make a little progress, you know, in the evening, cause really kind of pleasant.

And it got dark or motor along and we didn't really think we had to worry about staying in the shipping channel because it was a flat bottomed boat. You know, we only need about, you know,

a foot and a half of water really to move around. But we're going along. I'm down in the little cabin, I'm down in the cabin here, thump, and I look down and there's a little water trickling in.

Now you're up as a, Hey, we're taking on some water. And before too long, no bigger thump and some more water coming in. So it's coming in in the dark on the Mississippi River. Yeah, we're in the winter in February. Yeah, it's the middle of February. Ice cold water pouring in there. And I grab a bucket and I start bailing a pie bucket.

Fortunately, the pie bucket was empty. Yeah. Start bailing. There's another solid crunch and we start moving. And the water just is gushing in. I keep bailing because I don't know what else to do, but I'm obviously not keeping up with it. And this is. Yeah, one of those moments where I think, All right, this is how I die.

And meanwhile, while this is going on, we have a wetsuit and John is putting on the wetsuit at the point where I finally decide this is pointless to keep bailing, I put my head up. John jumps over the side with the wetsuit on and the water comes up to his waist. So yeah, calm down a little bit. Grab anything dry embedding bedding like that.

00;05;54;27 - 00;06;21;04

We can find and jump in the water. It's instantly it's like painful, cold, like icy water and walk into shore. There is nothing around right in the middle of the China National Forest, but there's tons of driftwood. So we build up a big fire and get warmed up and talk about what we're going to do. Greg is for the main builder of the boat.

00;06;21;04 - 00;06;50;23

Greg wants to hike back to that town. We were just there and buy a chainsaw and cut off the river. Really? Yeah. He he was done. But the notion of just giving up at that point to, you know, put all the effort in and we we were just getting started really. I would in those situations, I mean not exactly like that, but it would just be like, why did I make this same mistake again?

00;06;50;26 - 00;07;13;06

Here I am again, I should say that every time I get on a boat, basically. But yeah, so we get warm enough and we're not going to manage well staying out there. And it was probably about we just five miles back to that town. So we get to find the road and we start walking back to that town.

00;07;13;08 - 00;07;44;18

Now, do you have any like at this point, do you have any like dry stuff, like any food or water or anything like that? I think yeah. I think we had water bottles full and we'd gotten dried out and warmed up by that fire. So we were we weren't feeling terribly uncomfortable, just a little bit

brighter, I guess as we're walking down that road, a state trooper comes up and we tell him a sad story and he's like, Get in, I'll give you a ride.

00;07;44;21 - 00;08;13;09

Okay. So he gives us a ride. There's one hotel in town and he goes to this town. You know, it's probably one in the morning, one stoplight town. He's going through like 70 miles an hour, like, whatever. Yeah, this is great. Yeah. Give us a red light and spend a night in the hotel. And next day, John's brother drives down from Saint Louis with some battery powered tools and a handsaw and stuff like that.

00;08;13;09 - 00;08;38;22

And we go back out to the boat, and it just. It was my birthday, actually is February 14th, and it happened to be one of those February days where the sun came out and it was like 60 degrees. It was just like a beautiful day. So we built up this huge driftwood fire and we would take turns going out to the boat and, you know, you could be in the water for like 20 minutes before you're shaking uncontrollably.

00;08;38;22 - 00;08;57;02

You know, we tried hooking ropes up to the mast and pulling the boat over on its side so we could expose the holes. We spent a long time doing that, and it just started popping and cracking like it was going to pull apart. And it was getting late in the day. We were kind of we give up, but we tried one more thing.

We put a couple of large pieces of driftwood and we made like a little frame over the front of the boat and we had this hand powered winch on the front of the boat and we ran rope up to that frame and used the winch to pull the front of the boat up out of the water enough to expose the holes.

And we just used plywood and roofing tar and drywall screws and just slapped patches of and then got the boat floating and we bailed it out. And by the time the sun set, we were drinking beer on the fire and feeling pretty good about it. So amazing. That's amazing. What? Whatever happened to the boat? Well, we took it to New Orleans.

00;09;41;08 - 00;10;10;03

And you continued the trip. Yeah, we spent another probably a month and a half. We finished going down to Ohio and went all the way down to Mississippi and all the way to New Orleans with the patchwork plywood patches held. And that's amazing, isn't it? Is amazing. So you'd say it took like a month and a half. It was probably a better part of two months or until it was like getting to be full on spring by the time you got there.

Yeah. The further south we got on the Mississippi, the warmer it got, the more sickness there was on the boat. It was, Yeah, sickness. Really? Yeah. I mean, you know what? You're basically camping like that. You know, for several months. I mean, you try to be clean, the end up getting kind of sloppy and didn't take much of the river water to cause intestinal distress.

Sorry. Sorry. If I wasn't clear. Yeah, just stick it right in the pot market. That was really. That's an amazing story. Yeah, I was glad I did it, but I wouldn't do it again. And now a mellencamp moment. What do you think about when I see John Mellencamp haven't crossed paths? I've never even come across him in town.

Yeah, I only have the. The. The story of the only time that I ever saw him is I was walking with a client of mine when I was a caseworker out of a doctor's appointment. And John Mellencamp was standing outside of the building, of course, smoking a cigaret outside of the doctor's office. And I heard another guy walk up to him and go and said, John, do you have a motorcycle?
