
Gretchen Stulock (she/her), Teacher Librarian

It chronicles the rise and fall of the Sackler family and their direct role in the American opioid epidemic. It was gripping and an incredible piece of research.

Favorite podcasts: For news: The Daily from The New York Times. For comfort: Home Cooking by Samin Nosrat and Hrishikesh Hirway. For learning: Here's Where It Gets Interesting by Sharon McMahon. For reflection: Unlocking Us by Brené Brown.

Favorite bookstore: Locally, the Tattered Cover! But when I travel, this is one of my favorite ways to see a city. A few years ago, friends and I planned a "bookstore" tour of Chicago and it was a fantastic way to see different neighborhoods.

I've read that book countless times since then and it's my ultimate comfort story.

One book that changed your worldview? Homegoing by Yaa Gyasi. It's a story that covers an enormous span of time, and examines the history of enslavement and its systemic effects even years down the road. It was an incredible read and I still think about it constantly, even now years after I first read it.

Favorite reading atmosphere: My ideal reading atmosphere is a comfy chair in the late afternoon with nothing but the 2005 Pride and Prejudice score playing in the background. But my typical reading atmosphere is just in my bedroom, reading by the light of my kindle, where I've stayed up way too late to finish a book.

Favorite literary character: Emma Woodhouse from *Emma* by Jane Austen, and Peeta Mellark from *The Hunger Games*!

First book that made you fall in love with reading? When I was about 13 years old, I found a random paperback copy of Watership Down by Richard Adams in a bookstore. My Dad's best friend (a ferocious reader) gifted it to me for my birthday resulting in my love of reading and the fantasy genre.

One book that changed your worldview? Shogun by James Clavel changed my worldview for two reasons. The first is that this book is complicated and lengthy, requiring patience to fall into the story and the rhythm of the writing, but pays off in the end. Second, it is a story about two very different cultures colliding, demonstrating how differing perspectives can build knowledge and understanding.
